WILL THE SPOOR DIARY

Alleged That It Has Entry of Birth of Mrs. Ena Weich.

The trial of the suit of Mrs. Ena Welsh against the Swigart Estate, Chicago, is set for Jan, 10th in the Circuit Court there, and it is expected that all of the Kingston and Wolfe Island witnesses will attend. Francis King, K.C., Canadian council for the estate, may also attend.

When the case was tried in the probate court it was dismissed, the judge holding that Mrs. Ena Welch was not the child of the late Ald. Charles F. Swigart, Chicago, but the daughter of Tom Jim Davis, who was killed at Cape Vincent, N.Y., a few months after his marriage to he mother. Mrs. Welch appealed from that decision and many Canadian witnesses have already been heard

It is claimed that valuable information is contained in a diary kept by the late Morey Spoor, Wolfe Island. Mrs. Vincent Greenwood, granddaughter of the late Morey Spoor, is alleged to have stated that she saw the entries in this diary, the existence of which caused such excitement.
