

When you buy stocks in an enterprise that you know personally, or through information from a reputable broker or banker, to be sound and honestly and competently managed, you are speculating. But if you buy stocks in enterprises about which you know nothing and on a business meeting, it being the which you have not reliable information, you are not speculating-you are gambling.
