increased calls during 1923 were
owing to the use of so much soft
coal last winter, there being much
chimney trouble. The fire losses
this year will total over half a mil-
lion dollars, chiefly owing to the
big losses sustained by the Syden-
ham hospital and the Davis tan-
nery fires.
