Experiment Station proved that Barred Rocks consumed 32.6 per cont more feed per dozen eggs when 2.2 per cent. meat screp was used in the mash than when 13.3 per cent. was used. White Leghorns consumed 36.9 per cent, more feed with the lesser amount of meat scrap than with the greater. In other words, it required about one-mire more feed to produce a dozen eggs with a ration containing only 2.2 per cent. meat scrap than with one scontaining 13.3 per cent, of meat
