The morning service was taken by Mr. Sanders, mostly as an introductory service. He gave a heart to heart talk in a sympathetic spirit where every member was made to feel that all are on one level working together for the benefit of mankind.

At the evening service Mr. Sanders took his text from Philippians: "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended, but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forth unto those things which are before." In an eloquent and forceful address, he impressed his audience in those things which pertain to the present. The past is gone, the future we do not know. Let us benefit by failures in the past and use them in the present that we may in the future attain to higher and nobler things. In closing Mr. Sanders thanked his hearers for the splendid reception given him, and hoped that this new year would see an increase in every branch of the church, but the only way in which these things could be attained was that every member and adherent would rally round him and give of their very best.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT TO CITY COUNCIL

Two Very Big Fires Last Year Caused a Record Total Loss.

The annual report of Fire Chief Armstrong to the city council to-day contained the following statistics and recommendations: "During the year the department received and answered the largest number of alarms ever received in any one year, being 232. This is 107 more than in 1922 and 100 more than in 1913, which was the highest previous record. The loss by fire during the year has also been extremely heavy amounting to \$474,395.19 with four property losses and two vessel losses, for which the figures are not available as yet, which will I expect place the loss close to \$499,000.00. The previous high record that of the year 1914 was \$225,418.00.

"During the coming year it will be necessary to complete the work at No. 3 station, by placing a steel eye beam across the front of the building so as to carry the front brick work. Three pairs of new doors are also required on lower floor, the present ones being in a bad state of repair and beyond reasonable expenditure for repairs, the maneway on the west side of this station should also be paved for sanitary reasons.

"At No. 1 station new doors are also required on both halls, and all outside woodwork needs almost immediate attention both as regards repairs and renewals and also painting. The small room in rear of the battery room and between the two halls also requires re-flooring.

"While 550 feet of fire hose was purchased during the past year it has been found necessary to condemn 550 feet as unfit for fire duty, so that we are 100 feet short of the amount required at the beginning of the year.

"As stated in the report, the year just closed has been the heaviest that the department has ever been called to cope with and the work of the members in many threatening fires that we had during the year is more

than favorably recommended to your attention. Every officer and man has given the very best service possible on all occasions, and to their efficient work and devotion to duty is largely due the keeping down of the loss during the year. With the exception of two very heavy losses the year's losses will be found to be below that of the preceding year."

HELD RESPONSIBLE.

For Colliding With the Steamer Senator Derbyshire.

Justice McLennan, judge of the Dominion admiralty court, holds the steamer Lord Strathcona responsible for a collision in the St. Lawrence river in which the steamer Senator Derbyshire, owned by the George Hall Coal and Transportation company of Ogdensburg, was damaged.

The judgment was given with instructions to the deputy district registrar to assess the damage. In his decision he says that while the Senator Derbyshire was proceeding up the St. Lawrence river a little below Champlain the Lord Strathcona, proceeding in the same direction, overtook her and struck her on the port side, a little forward of amidships, and violated rule No. 24 of the rules of the road.

Family Team Ran Away, But Township Not Liable

William Storms and Nellie Storms, with a family party composed of Georgina Poste, Thomas Storms, and Wilbert Storms, were injured when their team of horses ran away at a "fill," and they sued the township of Portland for \$5,000 damages.

A runaway followed the fall of a whitetree, but the plaintiffs argued that there ought to have been a guard at the scene of the accident.

The complainants were driving from Verone to High Falls in August last.

"SEEING JESUS."

Sermon in St. George's By the Bishop of Ontario.

That Christianity is not an assent to a creed but a living union with God through Christ Jesus, and that the incarnation of His Son was the Father's way of revealing himself to man, was the theme of a sermon preached by the Bishop of Ontario in St. George's cathedral at the choral eucharist on Sunday, the feast of the Epiphany.

The Wise Men spent many long weeks on their journey in search of the "infant king," said the bishop. "We are all nominally Christians. We live in a Christian land and observe the Christian festivals, but many of us make no real effort to find Christ. We read or the Greeks who came to the disciples saying: 'We would see Jesus.' That was the spirit of all who would be Christians in more than name. The star led kings from the east who were not of God's chosen people, and it led them, not to a palace as they so doubt expected, but to the humble home of a carpenter.

"It is not a subtle theology men want but a simple faith that will teach us to 'see Jesus in our daily life. He may be with us in our business, yet and in our pleasures as well as our sorrows. What comfort or hope could be ours from the knowledge that a wise good man lived and died many centuries ago in Judea when we come to the end that is inevitable in this world? Every one of us gathered in this building will one day 'see Jesus' face to face. May the face we see be to us not that of a stranger but of a beloved friend."

The cathedral music was bright and inspiring and at the conclusion of services the carols were sung on the chancel steps.

HOPE AND CONFIDENCE.

Over Situation in Great Britain by Prof. Skelton.

Politically, economically and educationally, there was hope and confidence rather than depression over the situation in Great Britain, Dr. O. D. Skelton, dean of arts and science at Queen's University, and adviser to Premier King at the Imperial and Economic Conference, told a social gathering of Queen's Alumni at Ottawa Ladies' College Friday evening. Nearly 200 graduates attended the "speech-dinner," presided over by J. G. Macphail, president of Queen's Alumni Association of Ottawa, who introduced Prof. Skelton, and commented upon the wisdom of the prime minister in choosing an adviser so gifted an economist and an accurate historian. At the conclusion Dr. Adam Shortt moved a vote of thanks, remarking that Prof. Skelton had brought honor to Queen's, and foretelling that within five years the wealth of the world would be more evenly distributed and would find its way back to Britain.

At supper in the dining room, Mrs. Macphail poured coffee, and was assisted by Miss F. H. Stothers, Miss C. Stothers, Miss Kathleen Wynyard, Miss Margaret McIntosh, Miss Jean Paitt and Mrs. R. G. Dobler.

Next to Kingston, Ottawa was the most outstanding Queen's city, said Professor Skelton, and the Alumni Association had done all that could be done to keep its relationship with the university.
