

Dr. W. J. BLACK former Deputy Minister of Immi-

gration and Colonization for the Dominion of Canada, who has been appointed Manager of the Department of Colonization and Development of the Canadian National Railways in London, England. Dr. Black sailed from Canada on January 5th, and on his arrival in London will commence to put into effect immediately the vigorous policy of colon-ization which was decided upon by the National System last month. This policy calls for the bringing to Canada of settlers of an adaptable type—particularly British-born — and of locating them in sections of the country and on land where they will be assured of success commensurate with their ability and willingness to work. This policy also calls for the aiding of new settlers, by advice and other means, until such time as they are well established towards economic independence. This policy has the full support of the great trans-Atlantic steamship companies, the Federal Government of Canada and the large manufacturers of agricul-

Dr. Black is well adapted, by birth nd training, for his responsible position. He was born and brought up on a farm in Dufferin County, Ontario. In 1902 he graduated from the Ontario Agricultural College, and was appointed Editor of the Farmer's Advocate, Winnipeg, Manitoba. This post he held until 1905, when he became Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Immigration for Manitoba, From 1906 to 1915, Dr. Black was President of the Manitoba Agricultural College, leaving that post in 1916 to become Commissioner of Agriculture for Canada. In 1918, on the establishment of the Soldiers' Settlement Board of Canada, he was appointed Chairman and he remained in this position until 1921, when he became Deputy Minister of Immigration and Colonization in the Federal Government.


