Crowing of Rooster Stops International Cockfight

Sarnia, Jan. 16.—Herbert Kilbreath, Richard and Maurice Tinsley of Sarnia and five of the gamest gamecocks that ever threw a steel spur are being held in the county jail at Port Huron awaiting action on the part of immigration officials. A cockfight was to have been "pulled off" in this city Monday night between Michigan and Canadian birds. It is said, in an effort to avoid immigration and police officers, Kilbreath and the Tinsley brothers, with their game birds in wooden travelling cases, boarded the rear end of an empty coach which was attached to a passenger train at Sarnia and went through the tunnel. Before they could get out of the tunnel yard the crow of a rooster attracted the attention of immigration officials and three men and the five birds were taken into custody.

More One-Man Street Cars To Be Operated Here

The "one man car" service, which was recently introduced by the street railway company, has proven such a success that the time is not far distant when all the closed cars will be rebuilt and handled by one man.
