PRICE OF BEEF UP TWO CENTS A POUND

The Export Demand for Canadian Western Beef Is the Cause.

According to present indications Kingstonians will have to pay more for the first class beef from now on. On Thursday morning it was learned that the price of western class beef was by the quarter rateed from 12 to 14 cents a pound.

It is stated that the reason for the increase is the export demand for Canadian western beef. The local market has been flooded with local beef during the past few weeks and it sold at all prices.

Eggs which are a little more plentiful, are selling at all prices, according to quality. Strickly fresh eggs are selling at from 60 to 65 cents a dozen. Storage eggs are bringing about 45 cent dozen.
