TO CONTINUE ROAD PAVING

Board of Works Members Think Present Programme Should Be Retained.

The Board of Works held an informal meeting on Wednesday afternoon but no business of vital importance was considered. At the request of the members, the city engineer and the chairman will present a report at the next meeting as to the paving work which should be done during the year. Although a vote was not taken, the various members stated that they thought the paving programme which has been underway for some years should be continued. It was the opinion of the committee that the citizens were anxious that most of the streets be paved. It was stated that some of the debentures which have been issued for road paving in 1914 would expire this year which would mean that any work undertaken this season would not increase the tax rate.

The city engineer was given authority to call for tenders for material that will be required for the building of the pavements.

The Blue Garage on Bagot street was given permission to erect a second gasoline pump in front of its property.

The request of Thomas Lovett for damages for injuries which his daughter received when she fell on the street some time ago was referred to the city solicitor.

Several of the aldermen brought to the attention of the city engineer bad pieces of roadway. Most of these places will be paved during the summer so the trouble will be remedied.

Eggs which are a little more plentiful, are selling at all prices, according to quality. Strictly fresh eggs are selling at from 60 to 65 cents a dozen. Storage eggs are bringing about 45 cent dozen.
