"Ah," he said, "I shall not be able to sign again until (pointing upwards) I get among the harpers, harping with their harps." It struck him in the forehead, and he looked at his lightening flash as if he were a copy of great beauty.

There is an interesting sequel to the story of Maung Yang's contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society. A lady, living in the Scilly Isles, read somewhere an account of the poor leper's self-denial and was so stirred thereby that she organized a Sale of Work in aid of the funds of the Bible Society. When sending in the proceeds—a sum of \$130, she wrote to the secretary—"I want you to regard my cheque as God's increase on that poor leper's rappee."

When Coins Wear Out. It is surprising to know that a single passing over a coin actually reduces the weight of it. A wonderful electrical instrument known as the induction balance proves this to be a fact. When coins rub against each other in people's pockets and purses, drop on a counter or on the ground, and so on, they really wear. If you "ring" a coin to test its genuineness, you remove some of the metal of which it is composed. The smaller the value of the coin, the greater the wear. Experiments show that in a hundred years in the British Mint \$100 worth of half-crowns lose \$13 11s. 8d. of their value. The same sum in shillings would decrease in value by \$38 14s. 1d.; whereas shillings to the value of \$100 would be worth less than half what they were originally, losing metal to the value of \$50 19s. 3d. The loss in coinage value in Great Britain is estimated at \$11,000 annually. When coins become very much worn, they are withdrawn from circulation.

New Variety of Wheat. Reward, a new wheat, a cross between Marquis and Prelude, made the best showing in the experimental plots at the Dominion Experimental Farm at Indian Head this summer, according to N. D. MacKenzie, superintendent of the farm.

Reward gave a yield of 43 bushels an acre, which is considered an excellent showing under somewhat adverse conditions of wet weather and disease. Mr. MacKenzie said that the yield of wheat growing under field conditions was materially cut down this year by a new disease, Basal Glume rot, an ailment which is attributable to wet weather and wet weather. Under field conditions, Marquis made the best showing with 32 bushels to the acre, though a number of fields gave very much reduced yields.
