


STUDIO-LIVING ROOM.



An unusual feature of this house is the studio-living-room, the floor of which is on a level with the basement floor. This provides a room two storeys in height without loss of space on the second floor. A boiler is set in a pit so that the room is heated without difficulty. The cellar and boiler-room are under the dining-room and kitchen.
On a hillside lot, and by taking advantage of the grade, this scheme is admirable. A studio-living-room, with its high ceilings and large windows, gives a sense of spaciousness not often found in the usual living-room. A balcony has been designed by the architects across one end of the living-room. This balcony serves as a passage from the front entrance to the dining-room, kitchen and the stairs. The balcony, also, forms an interesting feature in the living-room.
Entrance to the living-room is from the garden at the lower level. Above this quaint entrance is a little balcony that is reached by a narrow stairway from the living-room. The dining-room and kitchen are arranged for convenient service.
Provision for the second floor without loss of space has been worked out by the architects. The exterior is a pleasing adaptation of the English cottage style of architecture. A large central chimney suggests comfortable open fires within.
