### WOMAN'S COUNCIL ASKS TRAVELLERS' AID GRANT

**From the City Council—Operation of the Isolation Hospital Arranged.**

A delegation from the local Council of Women, consisting of Miss W. Gordon, Miss G. Strange and Miss Ida Roman, waited upon the city council Monday evening and asked that a grant of \$300 be given to pay the agent of the Travellers' Aid. The request was very clearly presented by Miss Gordon, who showed the great benefits resulting from the work of Mrs. Wright, the agent, who was willing to continue her work at the very small sum of \$25 a month. Mayor Angrove said he would refer the matter to the finance committee for consideration.

Ald. W. Holder presented a petition from twenty-seven ratepayers on Barrie between York and Pine streets, asking that the roadway be not paved. Seven ratepayers petitioned for paving and three had not signed.

Ald. Joyce presented a petition in favor of the paving of Pine street. All four ratepayers on the street signed the petition.

A petition was presented by Ald. W. Holder for the construction of a concrete sidewalk on the west side of Goady street from the Frontenac school to Russell street.

On motion of Ald. Chown and Driscoll, the harbor committee of last year was re-appointed and directed to act in conjunction with the same committee of the Board of Trade.

Ald. Sargent moved, seconded by Ald. Richardson, that the sum of \$150 be provided by the finance committee to pay for the automobile expenses incurred by the chairman of the Board of Works this year. The mover stated that he was chairman last year and it cost him something in the vicinity of \$400 for traveling about the city overseeing the street work. He did not care to see his successor stuck for such an amount, and hence his motion. He had travelled between 2,500 and 3,000 miles in his auto on civic expense.

Ald. Peters, chairman of this year's Board of Works, said he did not care to have the appropriation made for his benefit. However, the council unanimously passed the motion of Ald. Sargent.

On motion of Ald. Richardson the hotel committee of last year was re-appointed, with the exception of ex-Ald. Anglin, whose place was taken by Ald. Sargent.

The following reports of committees were adopted.

**Finance and Accounts.**  
That the refunds of taxes be paid as passed by the Court of Revision.  
That the account as presented from the unemployment relief committee be paid.  
That the account in connection with work done at the fair grounds for the K.A.B.A. amounting to \$130.96 be paid.  
That the following dates be given for tags days: Alumnae Association, General Hospital, April 19th; Infants' Home, May 3rd; Orphans' Home, May 17th; Y.M.C.A., June 7th.

That the appointment of Miss Bessie Vince and Miss Ada Laturney as clerks in the treasurer's department be made permanent.

That the following be temporary appropriations:

**Board of Works.**  
That the application of the Blue Garage to install a gasoline pump and tank be granted, the location to be selected and work to be done under the supervision of the City Engineer.

That the City Engineer be given authority to construct and good rinks recommended by parks' committee, all accounts in connection with the same to be charged to parks committee.

That Alvin Jackson be appointed chimney viewer.

**Industries.**  
That in order to co-operate with the Board of Trade the same method as of former years be continued, that is, the industries committee of the City Council will meet with the industries committee of the Board of Trade, and the chairman of each committee with the Industrial Commission or to act as an executive, this executive to receive and investigate all propositions, and when, in their opinion said propositions should be recommended, to lay them before the joint committee for approval or rejection.

**Parks.**  
That the chairman, city engineer, and Alderman Price arrange for an open air skating rink in the cricket field; that an open air skating rink be placed in Victoria Park with Ald. Laturney as overseer, and one in the north-east section of the city, place to be selected by Ald. William Holder as overseer.  
That the city engineer be requested to take charge of making, and that Mr. Phillips, superintendent of parks, be given supervision, including the watering, over these rinks.

That the services of Superintendent Phillips be secured for the winter time, and that on this account his salary be increased to \$1,200 per annum.

That the chairman be authorized to purchase trees, shrubs, plants, etc. for 1924.

**Fire and Light.**  
That tenders be called for seventeen firemen's uniforms and three officers' uniforms.

That any horses of the department not needed for the summer be placed with farmers if satisfactory terms can be arranged.

That the fence belonging to M. M. Alarie, broken by the fire department, be repaired and the account sent to the fire and light committee.

**City Health.**  
That tenders be called for thirty cords body hardwood, green and dry mixed, to be delivered at the incinerator; delivery to begin on March 1st.

**Charities Committee.**  
That the Board of Governors of the Kingston General hospital be requested to take over and operate the city's new isolation hospital on the first of February, 1924; that the finance committee provide the usual \$6,000 for expenses; that the hospital board prove the council with a statement of receipts and expenditures for the year operating the isolation hospital, and that the chairman of the charities committee (Ald. Nash) represent the council on the board of governors.

The picture gave the salesmen considerable knowledge of the sanitary conditions under which this popular food is harvested, dried and packed.
