BIG BOXING BOUTS ON BILLS TO-NIGHT

Queen's B.W. and F. Club Holds Eliminations for Intercollegiate Assault.

This evening Queen's Boxing, Wrestling and Fencing Club, under the supervision of the Athletic Board of Control, will put on its preliminary elimination bouts for the different classes eligible in the intercollegiate assault-at-arms.

The boxers are particularly strong this year and by a system of straight matching some of the very best Queen's have had will meet each other to battle for the right to represent the University later on.

In the light classes McCartney and Hanna will fight at 118 lbs. Both these youngsters have had considerable experience and Hanna has come to the weight necessary to challenge "Skit."

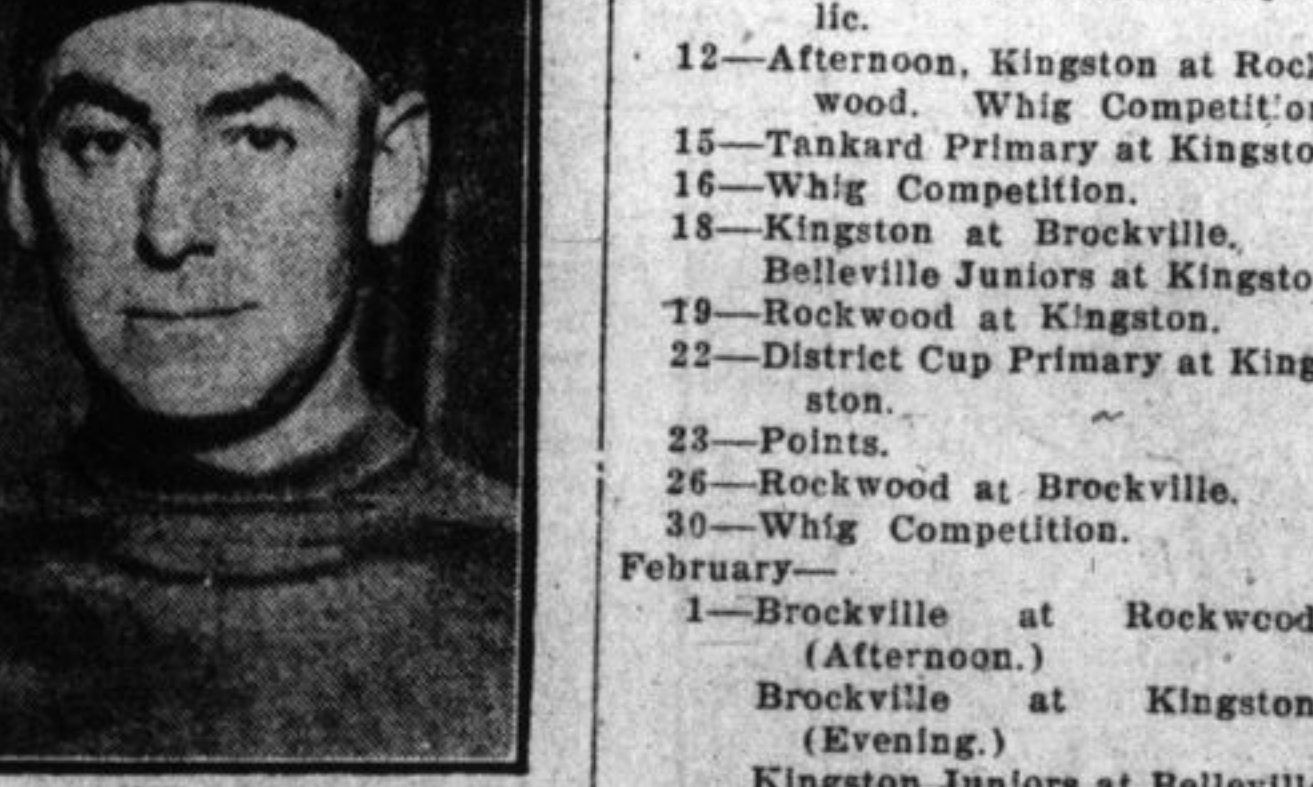

BUD FISHER'S HORSE PRAISED BY TURF MEN

"Mr. Mutt" Considered One of Best Prospects for Kentucky Derby.

Although the day is four months distant and the nominations have not been made, out in Kentucky they are talking of the Kentucky Derby.

More than a week ago Emil Herz, who usually accommodates the spectators inclined on this race, laid \$ to 1 in hundreds against both Wise Counselor and Sarazen. When the future books open on the Kentucky Derby, after the nominations have been made, these two horses will be equal favorites.

Barring the unforeseen, both horses will be starters. Because he is a gelding, the Derby will be the only classic for three-year-olds for which Sarazen will be eligible. Wise Counselor, easily the best two-year-old in Kentucky last year, and every bit as good in the estimation of those who saw him run, as Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt II's champion, will be

the chief hope of Kentucky. Out there now horsemen are talking about how Wise Counselor will win the Kentucky Derby. Only a few other three-year-olds are given as much as a look-in. Of course E. R. Bradley and his friends are sweet on the chances of Beau Butler, winner of one of the sections of the Pimlico Futurity. This son of Black Toney will be well up among the second choices if on nothing else but sentiment, and his performance in the fixture at one mile last fall. There is another Kentucky Derby eligible in which horsemen are keenly interested, Mr. Mutt owned by Bud Fisher, and named after one of his characters in his comic strip. Mr. Mutt is the horse that ran away about four miles while on the way to the post for the Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes at Churchill Downs last November. The writer saw the performance and at the time wondered whether the horse ever would get to the post again, for, after unseating his rider, Mr. Mutt bolted up the chute, and jumping the fence, ran around the infield for more than five minutes, eluding stable boys; then jumped the fence onto the main track and raced round and round it like a mechanical fly until he stopped from sheer exhaustion.

According to a friend of the owner, who recently made the trip out to Douglas Park where the Fisher string is wintering, Mr. Mutt is quite the most impressive horse in the stable. He has grown and muscled out and, barring a scar or two from slight cuts, has suffered none by his runaway. Alex Gordon, trainer of the Fisher horses, said that when Mr. Mutt unseated his rider, one of the straps of the coil's blinkers was broken, and the hood slipped over his eyes, which accounted in a measure for his performance. Mr. Mutt must be a lucky horse.

The colt came to hand slowly last year and was at his best over a distance of ground in the Fall. He won the Junior Champion Stakes for two-year-olds at one mile at Aqueduct, but his habit of breaking slowly militated against his chances, though all of his faces were good. He showed a marked liking for a distance of ground and his trainer now says that he can break as fast as any horse. His serious training will begin in a few weeks.

Although there has been zero weather in Kentucky the Fisher horses have been out on the track at Douglas Park almost every day this winter. Nellie Morse is another three-year old in the string that is well liked for the fixtures for her age and sex.

There are fifteen horses in the stable at Douglas Park, ten of which are two-year-olds. The older horses include Harry M. Friend, a four-year-old which never has raced; Mr. Mutt, Little Jeff, Comic Artist and Nellie Morse, all three-year-olds.
