



must be a lucky horse. The colt came to hand slowly last year and was at his best over a distance of ground in the Fall. He won the Junior Champion Stakes for twoyear-olds at one mile at Aqueduct, but his habit of breaking slowly militated against his chances, though all of his races were good. He showed a marked liking for a distance of ground and his trainer now says that he can break as fast as any horse. His serious training will begin in a few weeks.

Although there has been zero weather in Lentucky the Fisher horses have been out on the track at Douglas Park almost every day this winter. Nellie Morse is another three-year old in the string that is well liked for the fixtures for her age and sex.

There are fifteen horses in the stable at Douglas Park, ten of which are two-year-olds. The older horses include Harry M. Friend, a four-year-old which never has raced; Mr. Mutt, Little Jeff, Comfc Artist and Neltie Morse, all three-year-
