**BANK BANDIT "RED" RYAN  
IS NOT TO BE LASHED**

Solicitor-General Directs That  
This Part of Sentence  
Be Remitted.

"Red" Ryan will not be lashed. The solicitor-general for Canada has remitted the sentence of lashes imposed on him by Judge Coatsworth, of Toronto, according to a despatch received by the Whig from Ottawa late Thursday afternoon.

It will be recalled that the sentence of lashes imposed on "Red" Ryan, in addition to life imprisonment for bank robberies, brought forth a storm of protest from citizens in general. The Whig had a strong editorial in regard to the matter and many citizens also sent letters to the Whig protesting against giving the bank bandit the lash. The Whig editorial was broadcasted all over the country and as a result the matter was taken up at Ottawa. Now word comes from the authorities that the lashing is not to be administered.
