Two Weeks of Grace.
Official announcement is made that the issuance of motor licenses by the Ontario government for 1924 will commence next Jan. 31st, one day earlier than at first announced. As it would be a physical impossibility to complete the distribution of license plates to the three hundred thousand Ontario car owners in a single day, and as even a week would hardly be sufficient time, the Hon. George S. Henry, Minister of Public Works and Highways, has decided to extend the time limited until Feb. 15th next. This will allow a generous fortnight of grace to motorists in which to renew their licenses, but any owner who operates a car after that date not displaying 1924 markers will be subject to prosecution.

Before buying a lot to build on, make a careful study from an investment point of view, because it is the lot and not the house which may become more valuable in later years.

As to neighborhood, notice the transportation, the kind of neighbors, the accessibility of churches, schools and places of amusement. A district that sets too elaborate a social standard may encourage you (unconsciously) to raise your cost of living, as people tend to follow the lead of their neighbors. On the other hand, it is not good to live in a neighborhood that sets too low a standard.

As to soil, notice whether there will need to be much excavating and if so, whether it will be expensive and difficult. Is there good drainage? Are there trees? Is the soil such that trees and a garden can flourish? An ideal lot for a home site is one that can be made partly productive if desired.
As to improvements, notice whether there are connections for water, sewer, gas, electricity and telephone. If not, can such connections be made and at what cost.
Such points, considered with the purchase price and taxes, determine the value of property as an investment.
