### MISS STRACHAN'S DEATH WAS DUE TO EXPOSURE

No Inquest Necessary—The Funeral Takes Place on Friday Morning.

After making careful inquiries, Dr. R. J. Gardiner, coroner, decided that it was not necessary to hold an inquest into the cause of the death of the late Miss Ada Strachan, whose body was found on Wednesday afternoon. Although the coroner was not called until after the body had been removed to the city, he was satisfied that death was due to exposure. Dr. Gardiner, when speaking to the Whig, stated that he thought Miss Strachan after leaving the sand sleigh had walked for a distance of three-quarters of a mile, was very much fatigued, and had fallen down in the snow and died from exposure. When the body was taken to R. J. Reid's undertaking parlors, Dr. Gardiner made a careful examination and found that there was not the slightest mark on the body to show that there had been any foul play. He ordered the body to be prepared for burial.

The body had evidently been covered by snow, but the change in the weather on Tuesday and Wednesday had removed the snow to such an extent that only part of the body was covered when Harry McGrane found it. Contrary to previous reports, Miss Strachan was warmly clothed. She was wearing her overcoat and her con coat. In her pocket was some money, which clearly showed that no person had been near her since she fell in the snow. Her gold pendant was still around her neck. The body was not frozen as much as one would expect, and this was evidently due to the mild weather of Tuesday and Wednesday.

### THE ANNUAL MEETING OF BETHEL CHURCH

A Splendid Year's Work Reported—To Celebrate Jubilee in May.

The annual meeting of Bethel Congregational church was held on Wednesday evening when a review of the year's activities was given and showed that the church had enjoyed a splendid year. Robert H. Treneer, president of the church, occupied the chair, and Rev. A. S. Duncan conducted the devotional exercises.

**Had Wandered Far.**  
It is thought that after leaving the sand sleigh, Miss Strachan must have travelled in a north-easterly direction for about three-quarters of a mile. It is possible that she walked for a short distance along the road which leads from the Perth Road to the Montreal street road and comes out at McAdoo's farm and probably changed her direction when she reached Compton's farm. The place where the body was found would be about five hundred yards from the home of James Bell, which is located on the main Perth Road, a short distance from the point where the sand driver said he left Miss Strachan. The deceased did not take the main road, but went across the fields.

The search parties, which have been out continually for the past eight days, never thought for a minute that Miss Strachan would have been able to travel so far in the snow or they would most certainly have searched the fields. Mr. McGrane, who lives in the cement house on the opposite side of the road from James Bell, was not very busy on Wednesday afternoon so he thought he would make a search for the missing woman, and he was not on Mr. Bell's property very long before he made the discovery.

**As Strong Next Season.**  
In his speech at the Queen's Alumni dinner dance in Montreal, Principal Taylor devoted most of his speech to faculty matters at Queen's. The principal of the Kingston institution spoke with pride of the football team and stated that it will be as strong next season as last, as only five players are leaving, and such acts as "Pep" Leadley and Batstone are remaining. Dr. Taylor thinks that McGill will be the most formidable opponent on the gridiron next season.

Twenty-one degrees above zero was the lowest that the thermometer registered during Wednesday night. The ice at the curling rink and the Harry Arena was in bad shape on Wednesday owing to the mild weather.

**Finding of the Body.**  
Harry McGrane, when speaking to the Whig over the telephone on Wednesday evening, stated that from the position of the body he was led to believe that Miss Strachan must have been driven to that place by the storm. The heavy snow storm on the afternoon of Tuesday, Jan. 22nd, was coming from the south east, and about three quarters of a mile from where the body was found she walked with the snow beating on her back. Mr. McGrane, when asked how he thought that Miss Strachan got so far off the main road, stated that he was at a loss to know. He thought that it would be necessary for her to cross two or three fences to get to the place where the body was found. The body was lying close to a wire fence, which runs north and south and it was on the east side of the fence, which would lead one to believe that she must have climbed over the fence and then fallen in the snow and died from exposure. Mr. McGrane said that when he first noticed the body, he was certain that a part of the con coat which the deceased wore must have been caught on the barbed wire fence, but when he investigated carefully he found that such was not the case. A portion of the con coat was lying very close to the fence. Her hat was found in the snow about forty yards west from where the body was located. The hat may have blown there after she fell.

It is possible that Miss Strachan may have been able to get from one field to the other by crawling through the wires, but one fence would have had to be climbed.

There was great excitement in that section of the country when the body was found on Wednesday afternoon. Telephone message was sent to Kingston and the friends and relatives of the deceased were notified.

**Had Lived Alone.**  
The late Miss Strachan was the daughter of the late John G. Strachan, who for years was a clerk in the Kingston post office, and who died many years ago. Her father lived in the township of Pittsburg, previous to his appointment at the post office. After the death of her mother, Miss Strachan continued to reside at the family residence, 248 Division street, and her uncle, the late James Laidlaw, lived with her until 1921, when he died. She lived alone since that time. On several occasions it was suggested by friends that she should have some one to live with her, but she always
