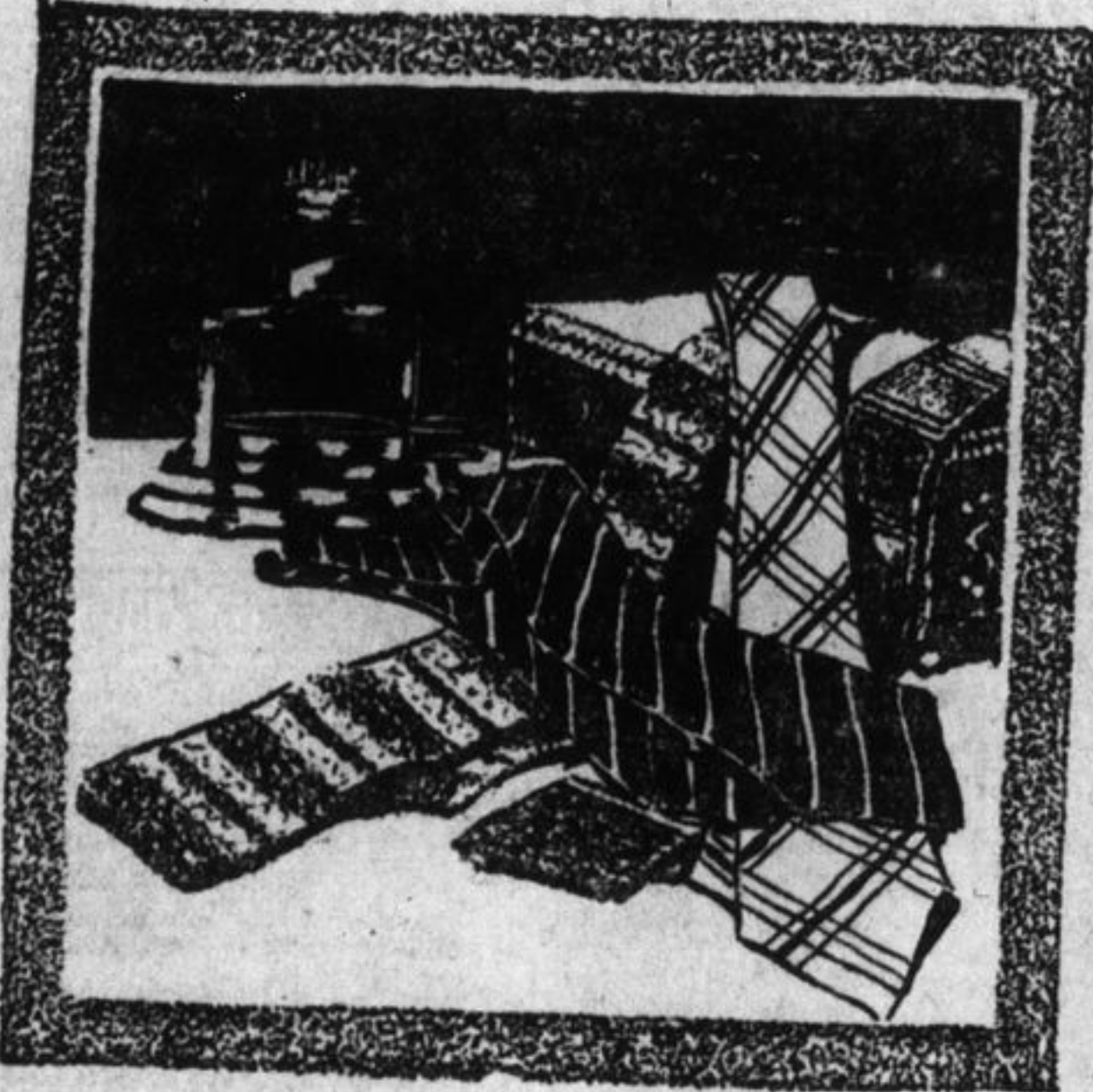

## ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH

### Growth in Membership and Finances—Good Contribution to Missions.

The annual meeting of the congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was held Wednesday evening, in the church hall, the pastor, Rev. J. L. Stephen presiding. A very representative gathering of church members assembled to hear the annual reports for 1923 and to discuss the work of the present year.

The report of the kirk session showed a highly satisfactory normal and steady growth in membership, which now amounts to over five hundred. The various activities of the church were being carried on with enthusiasm and success.

The managers reported the finances in admirable condition, the revenue having increased by nearly one thousand dollars, and the ordinary expenditure by less than two hundred. During the year the sum of \$13,175.57 was contributed for all purposes, including \$2,492.84 for home and foreign missions.

The Sunday school was being ably maintained under the superintendency of Mr. Gill and his staff, and showed an enrollment of 188 scholars and 28 teachers. The choir was giving the most satisfactory service under the efficient management of the active organist and choir director Mrs. Williamson. Very interesting reports were received from the Women's Missionary Society, the young Women's Missionary Association, and the St. Andrew's Juvenile Guild.

Many improvements and repairs to the church property were undertaken during the year, including new walks laid down by R. J. McClelland, a splendid modern lighting system installed by the Newman Electric Company, the re-decoration of the interior executed by Thomas W. Millo, and a new roof covering by Simmons Bros. The church property was being maintained in first-class condition.

A pleasant surprise was sprung on the meeting when Miss Davidson, treasurer of the W. H. A., announced that the Women's Home Association had decided to pay the whole cost of the lighting installation.

A high tribute was paid to the memory of the late F. C. Ireland, for many years a faithful member of the board of managers. Dr. W. W. Sands was appointed to fill the unexpired position of Mr. Ireland's term.

The retiring members of the board of managers, James B. McLeod, Hon. W. F. Nickle, K. C., A. W. McLean and C. C. Folger, were all re-elected.

At the close of the meeting, delicious refreshments were served by the ladies of the congregation.

## LETTERS To The Editor

### Claims Unfair Dismissal.

Kingston, Jan. 30.—(To the Editor): Now that the hall has been opened disclosing unfair methods regarding applications for various positions at the penitentiary, I would like to state my own case, which I think beats any of those recently published by the Whig. After furnishing the necessary particulars and passing a medical examination, I commenced duties as guard at the penitentiary, Nov. 16th, 1923. On Jan. 15th, 1924, while doing duty I was told that the warden wished to speak to me. When I entered the warden's office he told me to hand my uniform in the next day as my services were no longer required. As I had always carried out my duties satisfactorily, according to my superior officers it came as a shock to me as also to the other guards.

The next morning I visited the warden with the idea of getting some satisfaction. I asked him if he would write me out a character for the two months' service and also the reason of my discharge. He replied: "Go to the accountant's office and get your money and come to me after for what you ask." When seeing the warden again after getting my money, he said: "What is it you asked for?" I told him I wanted the reason I was discharged, on paper, so people outside the prison would know I was not discharged through trafficking or any other serious offence, but he replied: "That, you will never get. Anything I have to say about you will be forwarded to Ottawa." That is how I was discharged from the penitentiary without one day's warning, in the middle of winter, and a married man. I am now looking for employment. If this is justice, I would like to know the meaning of the word injustice.
