KINGSTON CITY UNION OF KING'S DAUGHTERS

Annual Meeting Friday—Work of Last Year—Miss Strange Re-Elected President.

The annual meeting of the Kingston city union of the organization of the King's Daughters and Sons was held in Sydenham street church lecture hall on Friday afternoon. On account of the illness of the president, Miss Strange, Miss Jennie Shaw occupied the chair.

The union secretary, Mrs. M. R. Davis, reported the minutes of the last annual meeting which were confirmed. The treasurer, Mrs. C. C. Abbott, read the report which showed a balance for the union of \$54.24.

The county secretary, Miss P. Cunningham, reported that 128 fees had been paid. The union has for many years supported a child in the Zenana medical missionary orphanage and this work will be continued. Mrs. W. Connell reported she had sent three reports to the Silver Cross magazine.

The secretary of the Charity Circle, Miss Ida Smith, made a report showing thirty-five active members and twenty-five associate members. Work was done for their room in the hospital, Pearson's Hope for the Blind, The Travellers' Aid and 100 children's garments made and distributed where needed. A rummage sale given and work done for the poor at Christmas time with 19 dinners sent out and a box of candy for each ward patient in the K.G.H., also presents were sent the inmates of the House of Industry.

The Food and Fuel Club, the best effort of the Charity Circle, reported \$2,198.29 collected this year from 193 contributors, this money being collected in small amounts each week by faithful visitors. This work has been carried on for the past twenty-nine years and in that time \$31,701.80 has been saved to the people, many of whom have formed habits of thrift which enable them to pass beyond the need of the club.

The treasurer of the Charity Circle, Mrs. W. M. MacKay, reported a balance of \$127.27.

The secretary of the Lend-a-Hand Circle, Mrs. W. Moore, then read their report and reported 46 members.

A rummage sale was held with good results. A supper was given to fifty poor children. Their room in the Kingston General Hospital has been well looked after and fifteen nighties and one dozen rompers were given to the children's ward. A supper was given the children in the Orphan's Home.

The Home for the Aged is visited monthly and at different times during the year a supper has been given them and a Christmas tree laden with goods things made them happy. Eleven baskets were sent out at Christmas. Twenty-seven bags filled with candy and a handkerchief were donated to the woman's missionary societies' Christmas bazaar. Donations were given to Travellers' Aid, Japanese Fund and the Woman's Association.

The treasurer, Miss Ida Garbutt, reported a balance of \$34.42.

Mrs. G. Greer sang very sweetly the song "Just As I Am," and was accompanied by Mrs. W. M. Campbell.

Mrs. William Gordon was then called upon and gave a very interesting address on the education of the new Canadian.

Mrs. A. Strachan gave a vote of thanks to Mrs. Gordon for the wonderful address given and a hearty hand clap followed by the members. The resignation of Miss Cunningham as country secretary was read and regret was expressed at the resignation.

A letter of sympathy is being sent to Miss Strange, president of the union, on account of her accident.

Miss Mowat took the chair and the election of officers resulted as follows: President, Miss Strange; 1st vice-president, Miss Jennie Shaw; 2nd vice-president, Mrs. A. Strachan; 3rd vice-president, Mrs. E. Walsh; 4th vice-president, Miss E. Smith; 5th vice-president, Miss H. Fraser; secretary, Mrs. M. R. Davis; treasurer, Mrs. C. C. Abbott; Silver Cross secretary, Mrs. W. Connell.

RECORD EARNINGS OF DOMINION LIFE

Excellent Progress in 1923 Was Reported at the Annual Meeting.

The thirty-fifth annual report of the Dominion Life Assurance Company was presented at the annual meeting at the head office, Waterloo. This report shows that the year 1923 was one of unexcelled progress.

The careful selection of the company's risks is evidenced by the fact that the cost of mortality for the year was only 33 per cent. of the expected. A record in surplus earnings was established, the amount reported for the year being \$473,142.
