ADVENTISTS' CONVENTION

Local Church Dedicated—Lecture on India—"Who Changed the Sabbath?"

All was quiet at the Seventh Day Adventists' convention, Saturday. No business was conducted. Adventists observe Saturday as holy unto Jehovah.

The morning church service was preceded by the usual Bible study hour, which was in charge of the usual officers although the building was half full of visiting clergymen. W. A. Spicer, the World Conference president, preached the sermon at 11 o'clock.

At 2.45 in the afternoon, the church building, which was purchased in October from the Baptists, was dedicated to the use of the Adventists. The manner of the service was very simple but deeply impressive.

Pastor C. F. McVagh made the dedicatory address. He related the experiences of God's people in ancient times and described how after the sanctuary had been completed it was given to the Lord and how as a token of his acceptance of the gift God filled the house with his presence.

Pastor W. C. Young offered a beautiful and impressive dedicatory prayer. Baptism by immersion was administered to two candidates for church membership by W. B. Lindsay, the pastor.

In the evening Missionary J. S. James, who gave twelve years of his life to India, delivered a very instructive lecture to a full house. At present India has about 1,000 native Seventh Day Adventists and 65 missionary families. The work is in charge of A. W. Cormack, with headquarters in Poona, in the Bombay presidency.

If missionary families were distributed in Canada to the same ratio of population in which they work in India there would be two families in the dominion. When a missionary goes there it usually takes two years to learn a language. There are 258 languages used in India. If he landed at 30 years of age and mastered a language every two years he would be 746 years old before he could say he had mastered India's languages.

On Sunday afternoon, Missionary James was describing to the delegates the work of the 7,000 Sabbath schools of the denomination. In these schools there are about 220,000 students instructed by 3,500 teachers, and conducted in 171 languages. The organization is so complete that every school studies the same subject at the same time in each of its departments.

Although the Adventist Sabbath schools only date from the early 'fifties, they have grown till they circle the earth. The last million dollars raised by these schools was raised in nine months and one week. Figures for the first half of 1933 were available and show that the contributions during that time amounted to \$470,730.00, which is an increase of about \$50,000.00 over the first half of 1932.

Pastor J. L. Wilson spoke at the convention Sunday evening on the "Sabbath Crucified between Two Heavens."

He declared that the Sabbath question was one of the greatest questions facing the world to-day and that the true Sabbath of the Christian brought to view in Genesis II:1 was the origin or place of Christ and that it was made for mankind, Mark II:27.

The speaker invited Hebrews 1:1-3 to show Christ as the creator and that thus the fourth commandment of Exodus XX:8-11 calls upon all to honor Jesus by reverence for the Sabbath.

He showed his audience how Friday, holy to millions of Mohammedans, stood on one side of the seventh day Sabbath of the Lord Jesus, and how Sunday, the first day of the week, stood on the other side. Thus he declared, many to-day were not discerning the true Sabbath of the Lord, but that as Christ hung between two thieves, so the Sabbath stood between two rival days.

"Who Changed the Sabbath" will be the subject by President D. J. C. Barrett, a speaker of power, in the S. D. A. Church at Collingwood and Union streets at 7.30 this evening.

CATARAQUI HOUSE BURNED.

Residence Occupied by John Grice Destroyed on Sunday.
 The home of John Grice, Cataraqui, was completely destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon about five o'clock. Mr. Grice is a sectionman on the Canadian National Railway and lived in the section house, located about half a mile east of the C.N.R. crossing at Cataraqui. When the fire was discovered it was seen that there was no hope of saving the building, so the work of taking out the household effects was commenced. Although the building was burned to the ground, the fire fighters were able to get all of the household effects out of the building.

The Senator's Donation.
 The receipt of an unanticipated contribution of \$500 to the funds of the Athens High School Alumni Association from Hon. Arthur C. Hardy is announced. The many people interested in the rebuilding of the school are greatly pleased at the gift, displaying as it does his very great practical interest in the welfare of the institution. At the meeting Miss Frances Moore was appointed treasurer of the association to succeed her sister, Mrs. McLoughry, who has moved from Athens.

MAIL SERVICE WILL BE INAUGURATED TUESDAY

Hickson Avenue Residents Will Be Given Long-looked-For Delivery.

The mail service for Hickson avenue will be inaugurated on Tuesday, so it was announced on Monday morning. The residents in that section of the city will have two deliveries a day and the delivery will be worked out with the present staff of letter carriers.

This is certainly speedy action in the matter, thanks to Aid. Howard Kelly and J. M. Campbell, who appeared before the postal authorities at Ottawa on Thursday last and asked that this section be given a mail service. Aid. Kelly took up the matter a year ago on behalf of the citizens interested and as a result of continually pressing the matter, has had the satisfaction of seeing the matter carried out to a successful end.

MISSION WORK IN NORTH.

Canon Vale Tells of Labors Among Indians and Esquimaux.

Told with the simplicity of a man of action rather than words and yet with a clarity that brought his hearers within sight of the outposts of the army of the church in the great loneliness where he has served his Lord for many years, was the story of his work set before the congregation of St. George's cathedral on Sunday morning by Canon A. J. Vale, of Hay River, in the diocese of Mackenzie river. Hay River lies eight hundred miles north of Edmonton and six hundred of those miles have still to be covered by dog train or waterways. Grown grey and weatherbeaten in the service of the Indians and Esquimaux, Canon Vale is enthusiastic about his work and cares not for the twelve-hundred miles travelled by dog train in one winter, sleeping out of doors with the thermometer fifty-two degrees below zero, to visit the outlying settlements and bring in boys and girls to the mission school at Hay River. The boys and girls are not only taught to read and write, but also to trap fur bearing animals, to fish and cultivate the land in a more advanced method than their fathers. That they appreciate their privilege was shown by letters read by Canon Vale from an Esquimaux boy and from the girls to the work given by the boys and girls who are encouraged to earn and take care of money. The boys become interpreters and one of the Hay River school boys was interpreter in the recent Herschel Island trial. Their parents are willing to send them to the school, which has only one room for about fifty scholars, and Canon Vale hopes to enlarge it until it can take in eighty boys and girls who will learn of their God and Saviour and go forth to teach their people His lessons of love.
