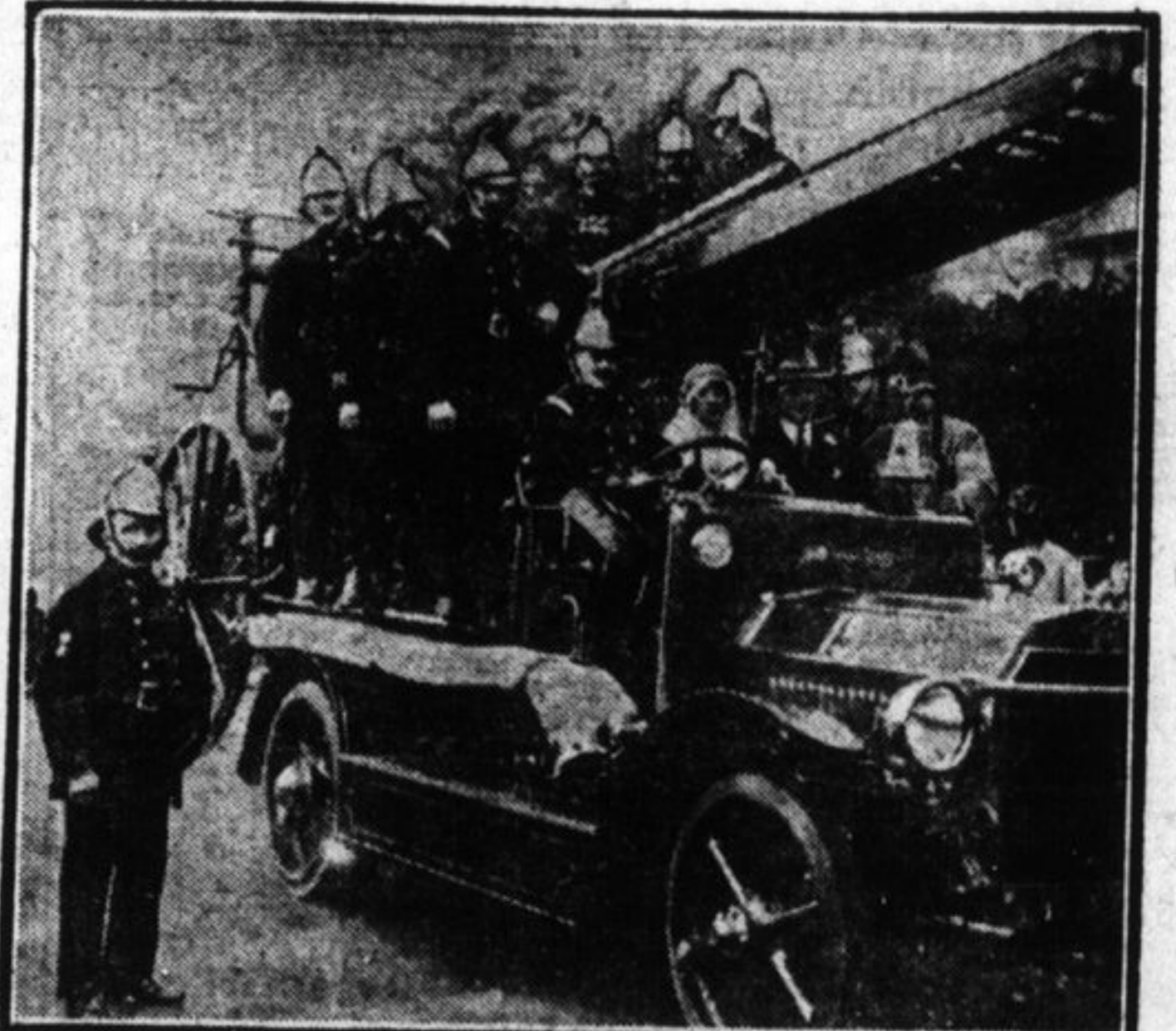
Frau Brockhoff, Germany's champion lady figure skater, is shown giving an exhibition of her art near Berlin, where the winter sports season is in full swing



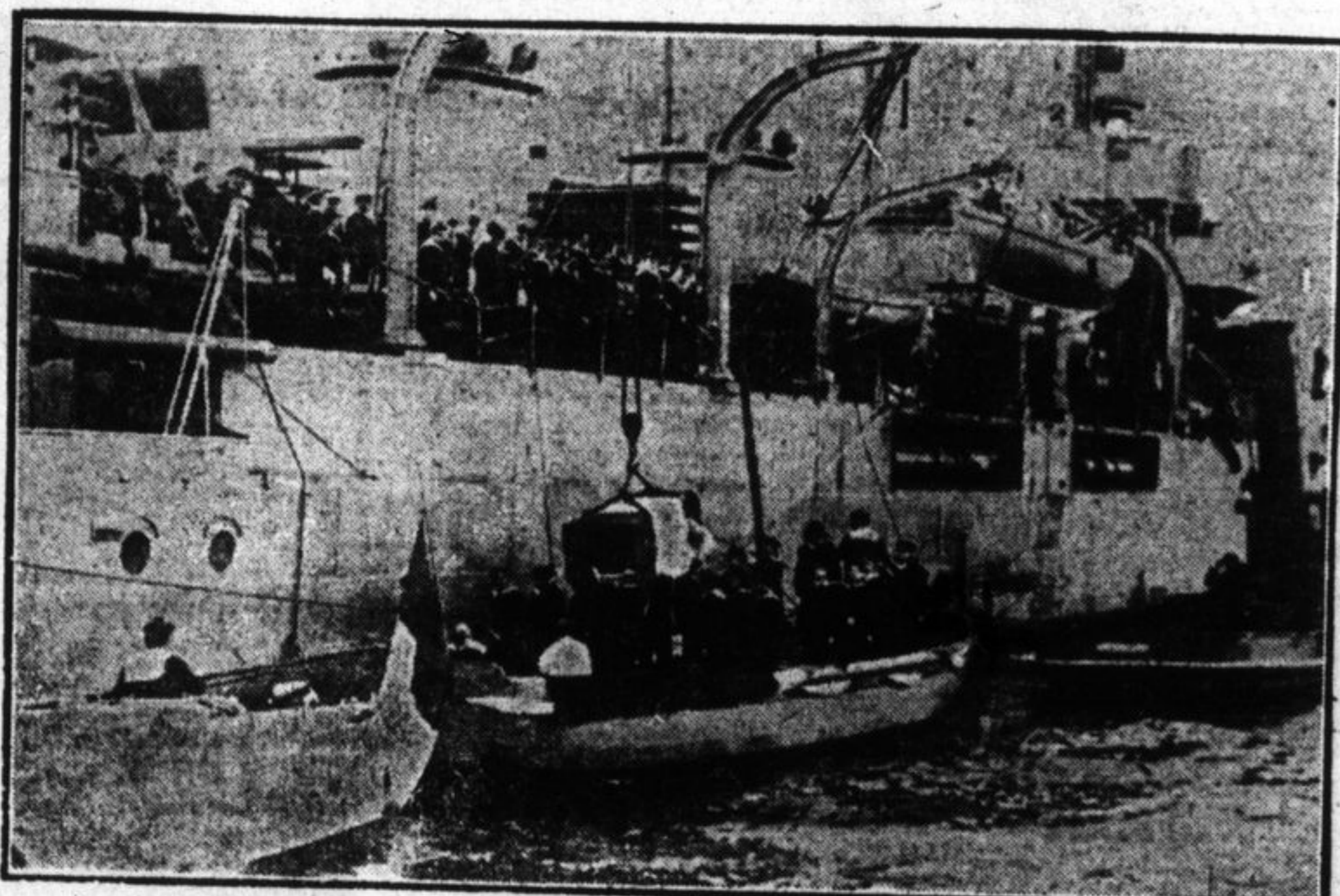

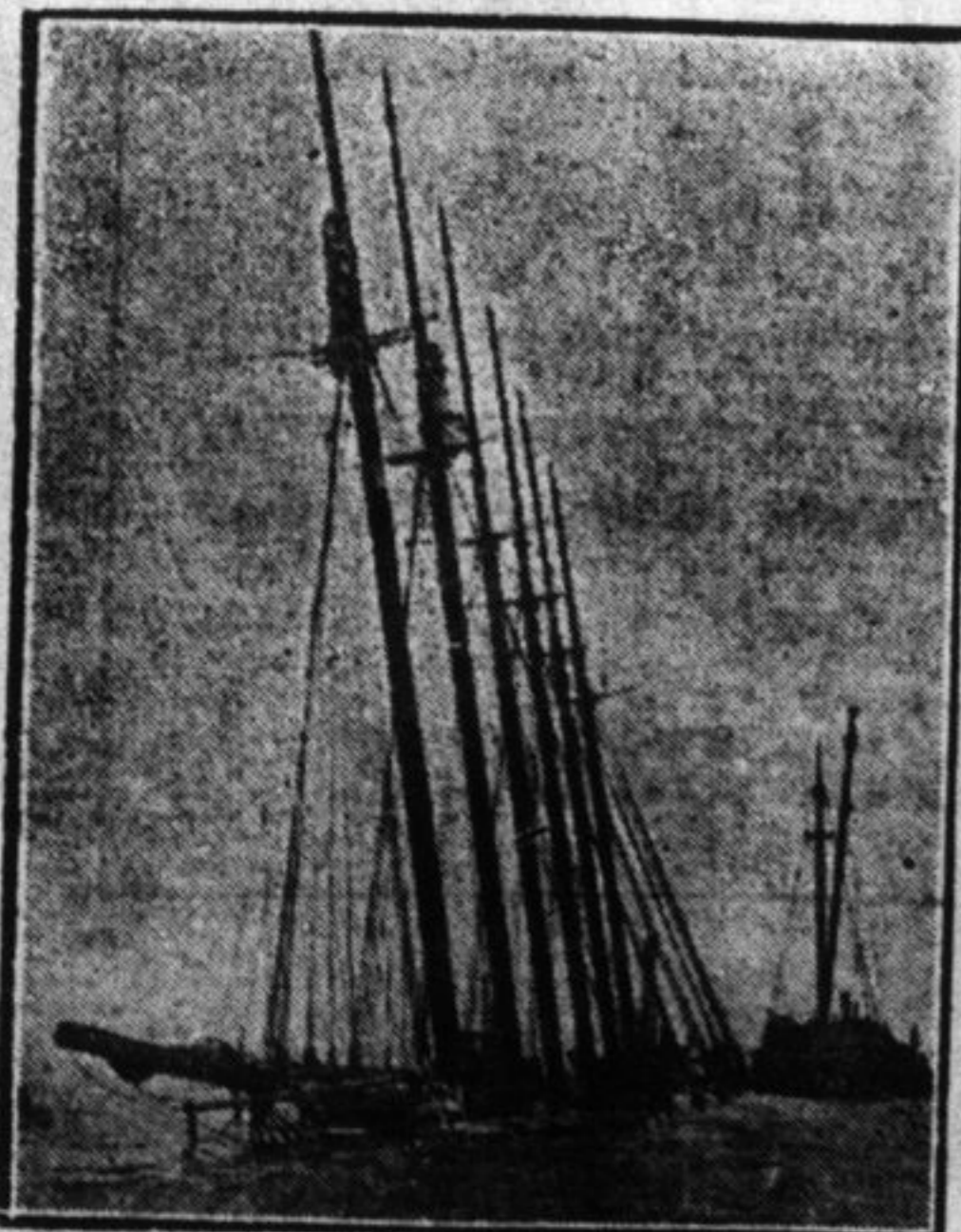
