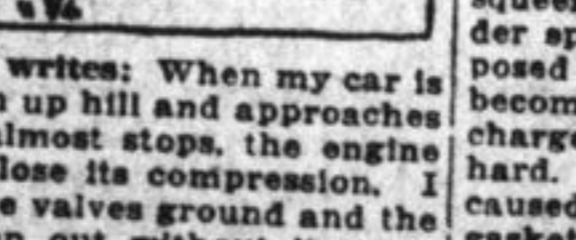
**The Poor Hill Climber**

*Its Generally A Case Of Deficient Torque At Low Speeds*

THREE-ARE LOTS OF CARS, especially among the older ones, which  
will run plenty fast enough and fairly smoothly on the level, but which  
"fall down" miserably when pointed up severe grades, and there is  
nothing more annoying than such a lack of hill climbing ability. Of  
course, if a car is geared very high, as many of the older ones were,  
modern hill climbing standards are not applicable to them, but with the  
normally geared car, failure to take grades creditably, is generally  
attributable to leaky cylinders or to incorrect mixture quality. An  
engine whose cylinders leak gas may develop high speed and fairly good  
cylinder leakage to produce its worst effects. But when such an engine  
is slowed down, under a heavy load, there is ample time for a large  
escape of charge on its compression stroke and the first step in curing a poor hill  
climber is therefore to see that all pistons are gas tight in their cylinder  
leakage. But unless the mixture supplied to it when the throttle is  
open and the gas speed through the carburetor is not very high is cor-  
rect, no engine will do its best pulling and so the carburetor should be  
adjusted to supply the most powerful mixture under the above condi-  
tions, or the best hill climbing results will not be obtained. If its  
engine is overloaded, so that vaporization is imperfect, or if it overheats,  
so that pre-expansion or even preignition of its charges occurs it will  
fail to make its car climb hills well. Then too, if through the presence  
of carbon deposits, or through the use of ill adapted fuel, the throttle  
knocking—full engine power cannot be utilized and hill climbing ability  
will be low.

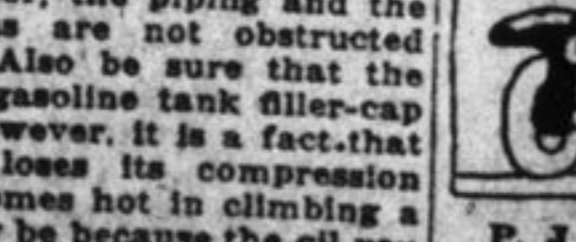
**ENGINE IS WEAK ON HILLS**

was before. Can you explain this?  
Answer: If you scraped out the  
carbon when you had the cylinder  
head off to change the gasket this  
would account for the cessation of  
the knock. Sometimes it happens  
that a gasket, which has been long  
in use, becomes very much flat-  
tened and, as a result of this,  
seeps out slightly into the cylin-  
der spaces where its edges are ex-  
posed to such intense heat that they  
become hot enough to preignite the  
charges when the engine is working  
pure. This may have been what  
caused the knock and as the new  
gasket does not protrude into the  
cylinders this trouble is overcome.



**CIRCULATING WATER BOILS**

F. J. D. writes: Just lately my  
car has begun to give trouble  
from overheating; the water com-  
mencing to boil after three or four  
miles of driving. The engine is in  
time, no heat valves, no carbon and  
nothing wrong apparently. What do  
you think causes this overheating?  
Answer: The best that we can do  
is to make the following general  
suggestions: Looseness of the fan-  
pump belt, resulting in low air and  
water speeds through the cooling  
system. Partial obstruction of the  
water circulation, due to scale de-  
posited within the radiator passage  
or to a faulty condition of the rub-  
ber hose connections. Dragging  
brakes, using alcohol  
anti-freeze you realize, of course,  
that boiling of this mixture occurs  
at a lower temperature than that of  
water alone. You state that the en-  
gine is "in time" and we assume  
that this refers to ignition, as well  
as valve action, but a retarded con-  
dition of the former is a common  
cause of overheated circulating  
water.

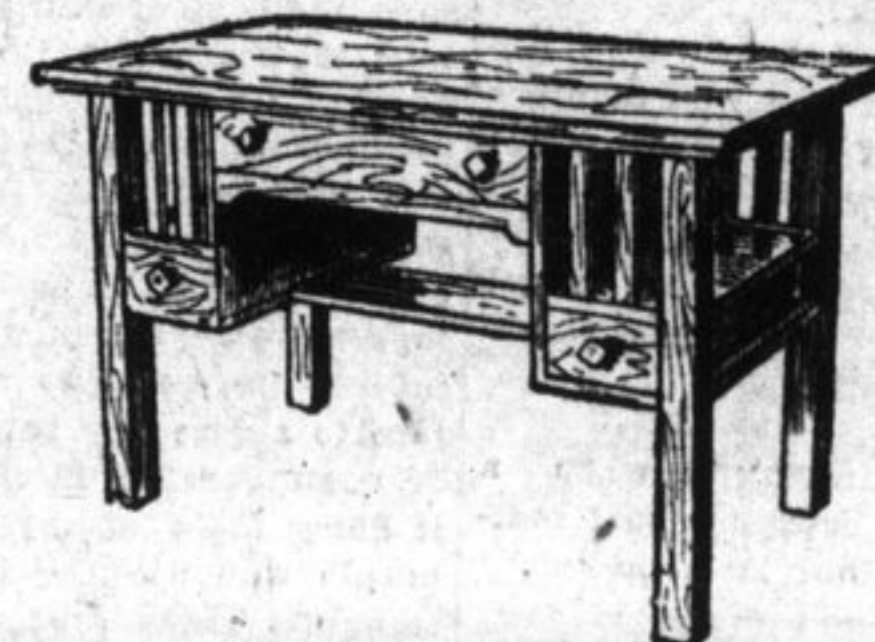
