FRA. CIS KING'S ADDRESS To the Kiwanis Club With Regard to Kingston Harbor Improvements.

The regular meeting of the Kiwanis Club at the lunch hour on Monday was the largest attended noon meeting this year. Francis King, K.C., was the speaker and dealt with that subject he knows so well, Kingston Harbor Improvements, under his own particular heading, "When Our Ships Come Home."

He outlined the progress of lake and river transportation in Canada since Cartier first sailed up the Gulf of St. Lawrence and asked the members to try and visualize the sensations of that intrepid mariner had he seen one of the modern six-hundred-foot freighters steaming along behind him.

He explained the evolution of lake traffic, especially in the trans-shipment of grain, and pointed out that as the ships became too large for the present Welland canal, Port Colborne super-dredge Kingston as the end of deep water and the trans-shipment station.

With the completion of the new Welland canal, Kingston would again take its place as the end of deep water and the logical harbor to be extensively developed for the accommodation of the large ships.

Mr. King told of the deputation which waited on the Ottawa authorities last week and of its arguments, which have already been made known generally, and which are so obvious as to make opposition seem ridiculous. He spoke briefly of the project to deepen the St. Lawrence to allow large steamers to go right through to Montreal, but said that it would be twenty-five or fifty years before that task could be completed. If it were undertaken, meanwhile Kingston is the logical place as the trans-shipment station.

The speaker expressed confidence in the fact that Kingston would be expected to see shipping activities here of a scope never before dreamed of, and also an influx of subsidiary industries as a result.

He received the warmest applause from the audience and the most cordial praise from Capt. John Donnelly and Elmer Davis, who moved and seconded the vote of thanks of the club.
