

"Canada's Arctic Islands." Mr. Craig, who was in charge of a party sent last year, gave an account of what had been accomplished by the party. Mr. Craig pointed out that with his party was a detachment of the R.C.M.P., which had gone north to establish police posts and also to maintain the sov ereignty of the king. Much scientific knowledge of the Arctic Islands had been gained and the speaker ventured the opinion that it was quite possible that there was great mineral and oil wealth in the Arctic. He was confident that some day Canada would be proud to say that

she owned the Arctic Islands. Describing his party's trip, Mr. Craig said that the easterly portion of the northern archipelago of the Arctic Islands had been cruised. A post established by another party in 1922 had been re-supplied and a new post had been built at Cumberland Gulf. Mr. Craig also referred to the justice carried on by the Eskimos were tried at Pound's Inlet for killing a fur trader. The police, who are highly regarded in the north, tried the Eskimos. One was freed, another got two years' detenfion, and the other was sentenced to a term of ten years' imprisonment


