LEADING EDUCATIONISTS TO BE IN KINGSTON

They Come From East and West to Sit Down at a Banquet.

Among the trustees who have shown ability in the work of the Urban School Trustees Association of Ontario, is T. Sidney Kirby, Ottawa. He was one of the founders of the association and will be among the able men who will attend the convention here which begins tonight with a get-acquainted supper in the Reg Room at Queen's. Mr. Kirby was the first president of the association and has ever since been a member of the executive committee. He is a member of the public school board of Ottawa, and for the past twenty-one years has been the finance minister of the board. He is very much interested in the financial administration of schools, anxious for efficiency and the best in equipment. He recognizes the changed conditions of life and is a strong ad-

vocate for manual training and domestic science in addition to a good liberal education, so that every young person may be able to meet the contingencies that will confront them when they take up the duties of citizenship. Mr. Kirby is known in Kingston. He laid, as contractor, some of its early granolithic pavements, and took back to Ottawa a wife in the person of Miss Minnie Shields.

There will be many other prominent trustees here. Rev. C. E. Jenkins, who served in the chaplain corps overseas, is a leading force in the G.W.V.A., in Kiwanian circles and in the church, is equally vigorous in educational circles. He will speak at the banquet on Thursday night on "The Education of the Child." The chairman of the Toronto Board of Education, Rev. F. E. Powell, will be with the Toronto group. Mr. Powell is a man of good physique, good intellect and genial in disposition. He will speak at the banquet on "The Child, the Canadian Citizen" along with Major-Gen. A. C. Macdonell, commandant of the Royal Military College and Principal Taylor. Dr. Putnam, inspector of schools, Ottawa, will be another entertaining speaker.

Four ladies are on the toast list. Mrs. Alexander Newlands, of the Kingston Board of Education, will tersely toast "The Child;" Mrs. Groves, Toronto, in captivating fashion will give child stories woven with fairy illusions and dramatic touches; T. W. Mills, Kingston, has to propose "The Child, The Girl, The Woman," and Mrs. W. R. Morris, Peterboro, and Mrs. K. E. Coltart.

A HUGE CANADIAN MAP

For the British Empire Exhibition to Tell All About This Country.

Ottawa, Feb. 26.—When the British Empire Exhibition opens in London next April, Canada will indeed be "put on the map." There has just been completed here one of the largest and most illuminating maps of this Dominion ever made. It will tell in a flash everything about the natural resources and physical features of this country, and tell it in a way that no map has ever told it before. This huge map is being prepared by the Natural Resources Intelligence Service of the department of the Interior in co-operation with the Canadian Pacific Railway. It is 28 feet long and 10 feet high, and is illuminated by more than eleven hundred electric lamps. It is made of steel, and is in eight sections for transportation purposes. The actual map is painted on to the steel in permanent colors, with all the rivers, lakes, cities, transportation lines, boundaries and territories marked in the usual way. In addition, every natural resource and product of the Dominion is clearly marked in the locality where they are found. Everything there is to know about the wealth of Canada is recorded.

But the unique feature of the map is that every spot where a certain natural product is found or an industry is in existence, is illuminated with electric lights of distinctive colors. For example, where copper is found, a purple light, conspicuous and brilliant, will mark the place. Where water power is present, it will be shown by a white light, with pulp in green, timber in brown, and so on. Each city is shown with a larger light, and each railway line is shown through a series of perforations in different colors—the C.P.R. in red, the Canadian National in green, and others in yellow.

These are illuminated by an intricate system of wiring. But they can be lighted separately. If a visitor wants to know where gold is found in Canada, the official in charge of the map will press a button and every place where gold is found will be illuminated, and none others. Similarly if he wants to see where wheat is raised, where textiles are manufactured, or where timber is found, the distinguishing lights will be switched on. At each side of the map an illuminated index will be placed, on which the key of each resource or industry is given. On the opposite side of the map will be an indicator which will reveal the statistics connected with any particular product. If a prospective settler asks where flax is produced, the lights will go on the map, and if he wants to know the annual production and other things, it is immediately available on the indicator.

The map will undoubtedly be one of the sights of the Empire Exhibition, but it will also be used in other parts of the world, for it is built on permanent lines.
