Junior Petes To Meet Circle-Six in Junior O. H. A. Second Round.

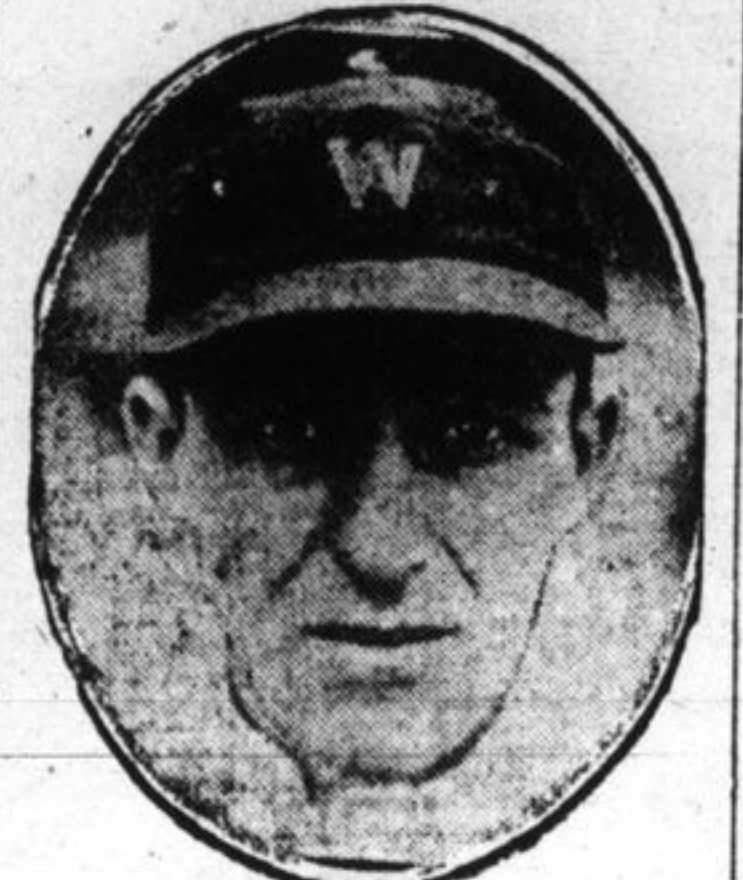
The hockey fans are all alert for tomorrow night's big game between the Peterboro Juniors and Circle-Six in the second round of the junior O.H.A. semi-finals.
