**LETTERS To The Editor**

**Wants Nova Scotia Coal.**  
 Hamilton, March 1.—(To the Editor): Nova Scotia has been mining and shipping coal for the past fifty years and all this part of Ontario has been using some coal for a similar period, the quantity constantly becoming greater, until today we use about 10,000,000 tons annually.

Much as Ontario would like to have used all Canadian fuel for many years past, no private enterprise has been organized to transport, via water, Nova Scotia coal to Ontario. So if the government undertook this now, it could not be said that it was interfering with private enterprise, and if it did, personally, I don't regard that as any crime, or even a sin, but in case of necessity or emergency rather a blessing.

With a considerable number of idle government Merchant Marine boats tied up in idleness in the vicinity of Montreal, rapidly deteriorating, the only explanation offered, as far as I know, is that their large, heavy engines, boilers and machinery, are placed in the centre of the vessels, which with necessary fuel accommodation leaves little or no room for cargo.

Irrespective of what may be the correct reason for this idleness, I suggest turning them into coal barges (however degrading that might seem) that their boilers, engines and machinery be removed, which would lighten their draft from four to six feet and the non-requirement of power fuel would lighten their draft a couple of feet more, so they would carry a 2,000 ton cargo of coal from Nova Scotia to Hamilton and all other Ontario and Quebec ports, and a steamer flagship would tow half a dozen of these and transport this coal for \$1.50 per ton at most, and I believe eventually for \$1.00.

Whether the government convert the idle marines or not, it certainly seems to be their duty in the interest of Canada to immediately inaugurate a lake carrying fleet of coal barges, for Nova Scotia and Alberta coal, now that the Nova Scotia coal has proven so excellent for cooking, and I believe Alberta coal is just as good.

Dean Stary Announces Mission By Bishop of Montreal.

In a strong and practical sermon the Dean of Ontario, preaching in St. George's cathedral on Sunday morning, set forth the purpose of Lent as a time of spiritual refreshment and of ascertaining where we ourselves stand in our Christian belief and life. The dean referred to a good side to the controversy going on in the United States at present. It was making men think. On a crowded train he saw a well-known business man reading the Bible. He knew him and ventured to question him on the matter. The man said, "I believed in the doctrines of the church because I learned them from my mother, but my belief was vague. I want to find out the truth of the matter for myself." This the dean felt was a hopeful sign. We want to be able to give a reason for our faith. With this end in view he had asked the Bishop of Montreal to conduct a teaching mission in the cathedral, beginning next Sunday. The addresses will be in no sense controversial but the essential truths of the Christian faith will be set forth. The dean urged the members of the parish to endeavor to make the mission a success by their prayers, their influence and their regular attendance during the four days of the Bishop Farthing stay in Kingston.
