

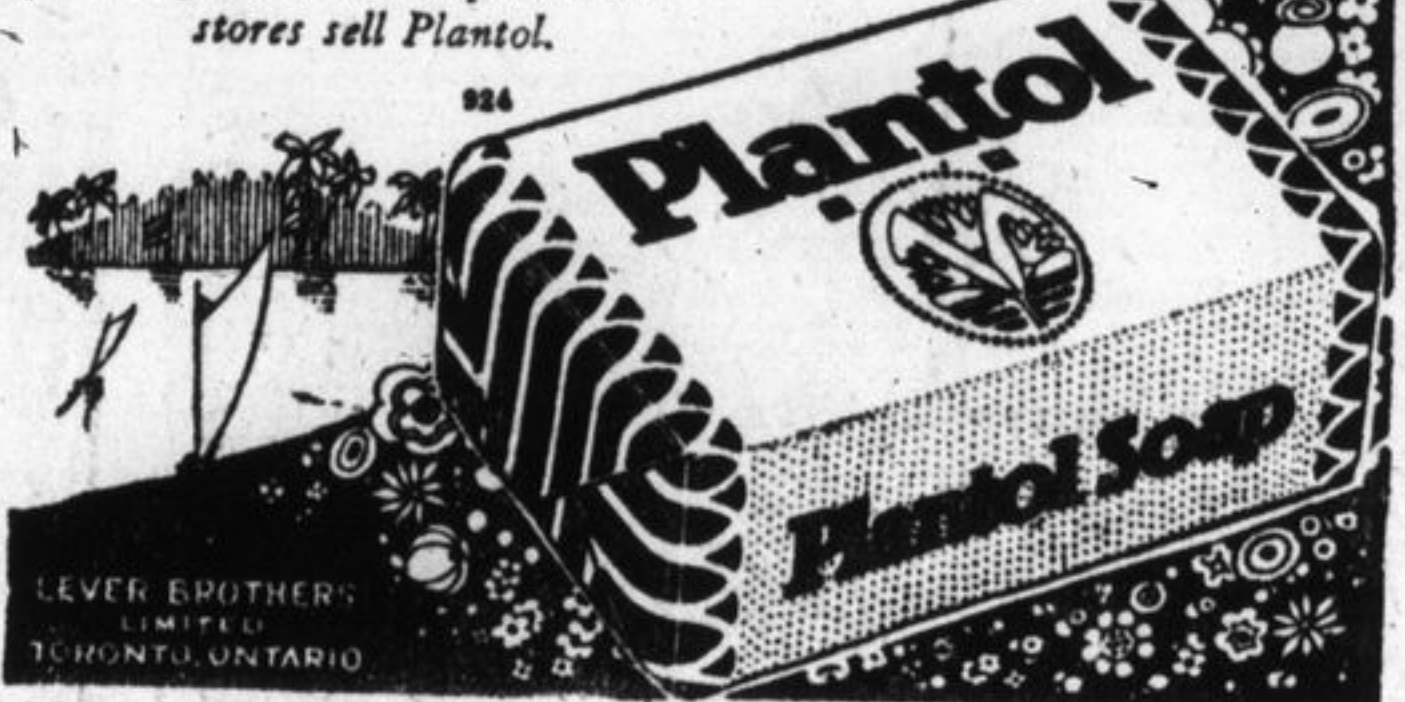

SUCCESSFUL BALL HELD

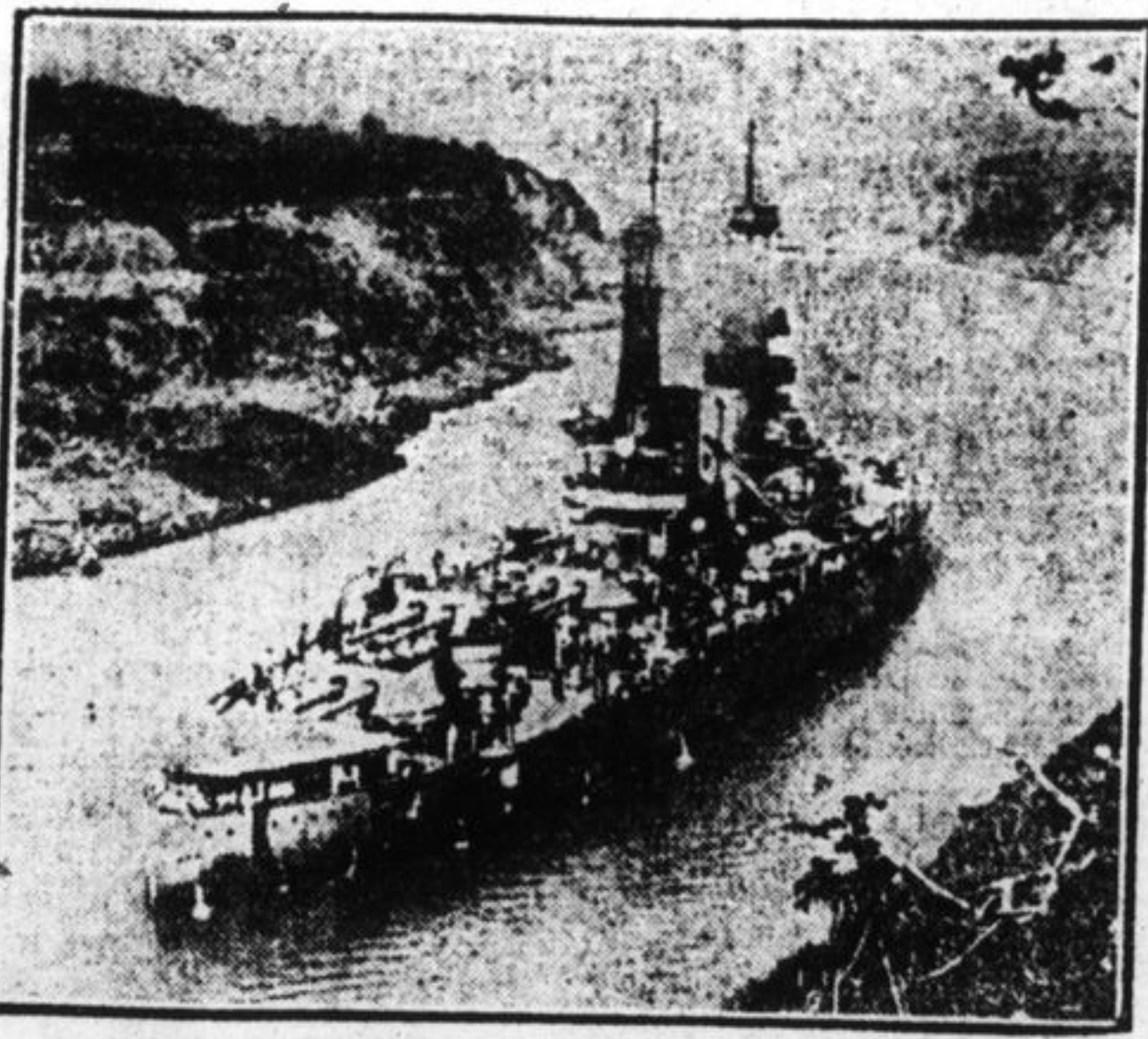
Interesting Events Enjoyed by the People of Wolfe Island.

Veteran Police Magistrate Retires After Long Service

Perth, March 4.—A very important change was made here in the administration of justice for this district when Henry Taylor, for twenty-five years police magistrate, retired in favor of J. S. McNeely.

Mr. Taylor, who will be seventy-nine years of age on June 5th, 1924, has a wide reputation for being absolutely fair and impartial in all his rulings during his quarter-century of service as police magistrate. 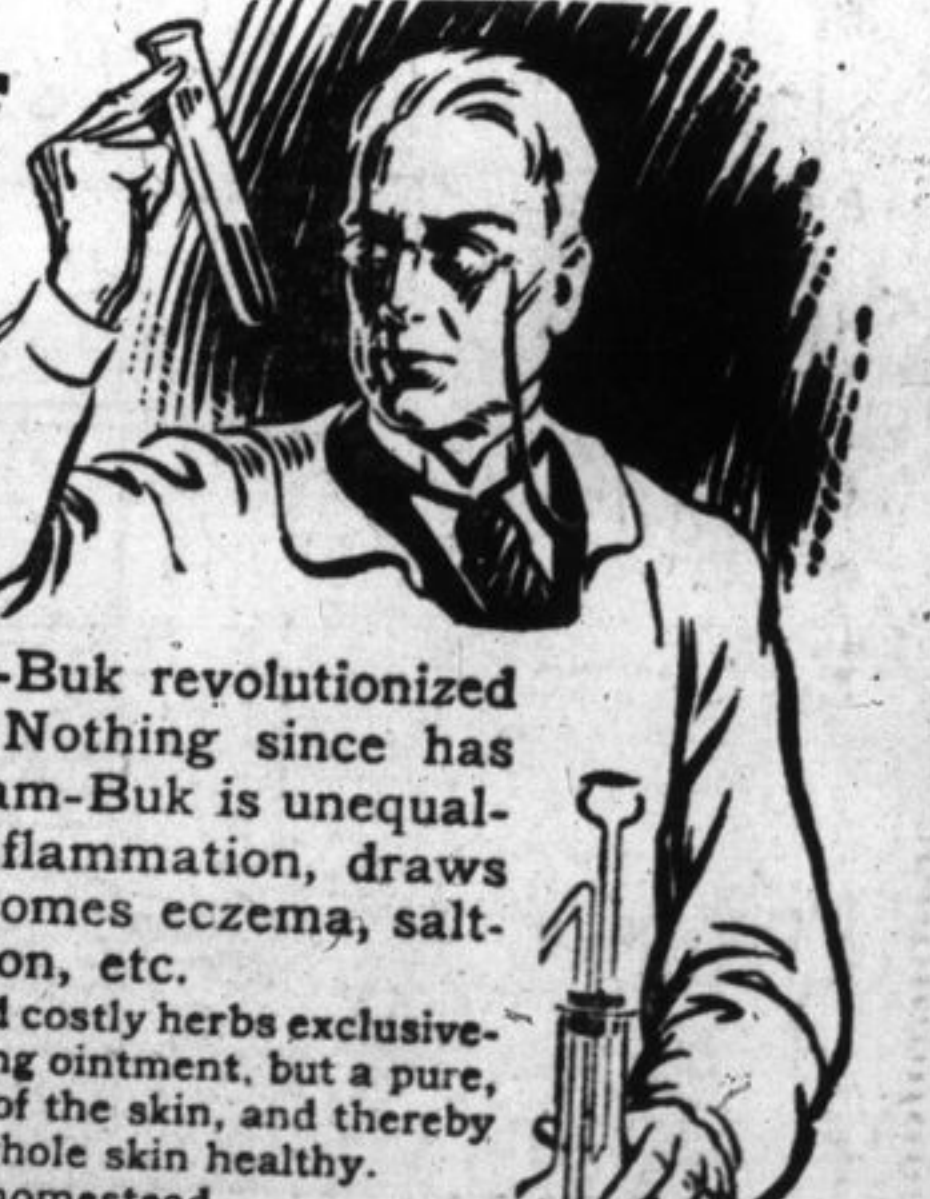
