

THE QUEEN'S DEBATERS ARE AGAIN VICTORIOUS

They Defeat Loyola Representatives and Win the Intercollegiate Championship.

spelled victory for Queen's in Monfeated their opponents, Messrs, Ken- press, nedy and Scott in the Intercollegiate debate "Resolved that the activities of the League of Nations justify its continued existence." Queen's team won on sheer merit Thursday evening in Convocation hall. Although beaten, the Loyola representatives have nothing to be ashamed of as they put up one of the best arguments against more experienced opponents which has been heard here in some time.

The affirmative rested its case on how the League of Nations had been created in a time of chaos, what its aim was and how it had carried out its duties most successfully in each case. To prove his contention, Mr. Kennedy cited some of the numerous disputes which the League had had to deal with since its inception in 1918. The dispute between Sweden and Finland had been settled successfully, Austria had been encouraged and her currency put on a stable basis again. These and numrous other cases the affirmative leader and his colleague cited to prove that the activities of the League of Nations did justify its continued exstence, because in all these cases the league had acted boldly and had settled the dispute.

Mr. Sinclair and his colleague, Mr. Sisco, in showing the negative side of the question, pointed out that the league had done nothing more than aid the victors to exert their will, to crush down their vanquished opponents, and to gain control of terriby means of "mandates" which were nothing more or less than poorly disguised seizures of the colonies of the vanguished. In no case had the league settled anything detrimental to the interests of any of the great powers concerned, secret alliances were being formed now the same as ever, and in spite of this wonderful league, Europe was in far worse state now than she ever was. It was foolish to rant about the humanitarian things the league had done These things, such as white slave traffic and opium traffic had been met and successfully combatted before, when there was no eague. Mr. Sisco, the last speaker on the negative, stated that five years of the League of Nations had been formed, the United States as well as many other nations were still non-members of the league, and that all Europe was arming not more so than ever because the members of the league themselves have no faith in it.

By such convincing arguments, the negative side was declared the win-

ner in the debate. Friday morning it was learned that the Queen's team, Messrs. Smith and MacFarlane, were also successful in Montreal Thursday evening, thus giving Queen's a clean sweep in Intercoilegiate debating.
