**Exchange of Pastors.**  
Rev. Dr. E. C. Laker, pastor of Bell Street Methodist church, Ottawa, will leave at the end of June, an exchange of pastors between him and Rev. W. G. Clarke, B.A., Trenton, having been effected.

**Just Like Old Times.**  
The Napanee Express says: Two citizens who were racing their horses on Dundas street on Saturday evening appeared before the magistrate on Monday morning and paid \$5 each for their fun. Any others trying the same sport will likely be assessed much higher.

**Gift Of A Fine Organ.**  
A new Skinner organ, costing upwards of \$22,000 is the gift of Mrs. Emma Flower Taylor to the Trinity Episcopal church, Watertown, N.Y. The installation will be completed by August 1st. It will be the largest organ ever installed in northern New York.

**Bonus for Trees.**  
Hon. George S. Henry, provincial minister of public works and highways has announced a change in the method of financing the planting of trees along public highways. Instead of sending out its own workmen, he says the new government has a scheme whereby farmers planting trees in front of their own property will be bonused so much per tree for planting.

**Snow Crushed Hotel Sheds.**  
The sheds of the St. John's hotel Marmora, collapsed under the weight of the great quantity of snow on the roofs. Seven horses and several cutters and sleighs were in them and the great wonder is that not even a single horse was injured although some of the sleighs and cutters were smashed so badly that their owners could not go home with them.

**To Aid in Equipment.**  
The Athens High School Alumni

Association has written a letter to the Leeds county Old Girls and Boys Association, Toronto, for its offer of assistance to equip the laboratory of the new high school, and to assure it that the school will be re-built this summer, the contract having been let and the building to be finished by Oct. 1st. The offer is more especially appreciated, being unostentatious.

**Forty-Six Mill Tax Rate.**  
The agitation against the increased amounts being asked for in several districts by the school boards was echoed at Perth when the council referred back the 1924 estimates on schools for a conference with the members of the Board of Education. After the conference it was seen that the Board of Education estimate would not be reduced, so that the only course open to the council was to add three mills to the tax rate to cover the extra amount for schools, thus making the local rate 46 mills. The proportion of school taxes to the total assessment is now about forty per cent.

**CRIME DETECTION.**

A New Factor Unearthed by the French Police.

Paris, March 7.—The French police have discovered a new auxiliary in the detection of crime. It is called "crime dust." Dr. Locard, an expert who figured prominently in the recent poison-pen case, has gathered the elements of the discovery and presented them to the authorities, who have already put them in effect. The theory is that if the clothes of a suspected criminal be thoroughly beaten, the dust collected from them, when examined microscopically, will show exactly where he has been.

Thus, one of the vagabonds suspected of the murder of a man found in a quarry, was asked where he had passed the night. He said he had slept in the fields. When the dust from his clothes was examined, it showed a number of chalky molecules coinciding exactly with the dust in the quarry. Pressed further by the detectives, the vagabond finally confessed to the murder. It is said the "crime dust" method has an infinite variety of applications.

**Man's Nose Bitten Off.**  
Saskatoon, March 7.—A vicious horse snapped at Gus Newman, a farmer, at Amaranth, Manitoba, and bit his nose completely off, according to word received here. Newman has left for a Winnipeg hospital, in the hope of getting a new nose grafted on his face, but he was given little encouragement by doctors.
