CASES IN POLICE COURT

Two Liquor Charges Adjudged—Charge Against a Junk Dealer Dismissed.

There were three cases on the docket in the police court on Friday morning. A citizen, who is serving a fifteen day sentence in the county jail on the charge of driving a motor car while under the influence of liquor, was charged with driving an automobile at a furious rate of speed. At the request of A. B. Cunningham, who was acting for the accused, the case was adjourned until Monday morning.

M. Rosen was charged with purchasing junk or brass while not having a junk dealer's license. After hearing the evidence of two boys who sold the brass on February 20th, A. B. Cunningham who defended Rosen, contended that the latter did not violate the city by-law in this respect, and the court agreed with him and dismissed the charge. A. Revelle asked that the two boys who were to give evidence would be given the protection of the court, and this was granted. The two boys claimed that they stole the brass and that they went to the home of Mr. Rosen on February 20th and sold the brass and received \$1.30 for it.

The case of Joseph Feeny, who was charged with unlawfully trafficking in liquor, was heard and the police magistrate enlarged the case for one week. On Thursday, March 6th, when a case of trafficking was heard, it was brought out in evidence that Feeny was standing on Princess street and a stranger came along and asked him if he knew where he could locate a certain man who he understood he could get liquor from. Feeny advised the man in question to wait as the bootlegger would likely come along very shortly, which he did. Feeny, the bootlegger and the other man who had a great thirst, walked down the street and a short time later a bottle of liquor was secured from the bootlegger. The man who purchased the bottle presented a \$10 bill in payment, and when the bootlegger was unable to make the change, Feeny handed over the \$2.

T. J. Rigney, who prosecuted, claimed that Feeny was a party to the deal when he asked the thirsty one to wait and a bootlegger would come along and went down street with the two and made change he made himself a party to the deal.

Mr. Cunningham claimed that Feeny did not have control of the liquor. He was not asked to make change but did voluntarily.

In answer to this statement Mr. Rigney asked the question why it was that Feeny accompanied the other two men to the hotel and made change. Mr. Cunningham cited a number of cases which he claimed were similar to this one, and so the court enlarged the case for one week and stated that if the two lawyers had any other cases which might assist him in arriving at a decision, he would be pleased to hear from them.

Mrs. J. H. Robertson testified to the work of Mrs. Brown in the various organizations of the church. March 30th was fixed as the date for the declaring of the pulpit in Barrie vacant. Rev. Mr. Brown will be inducted into his new charges at Chalmers church on March 23th.

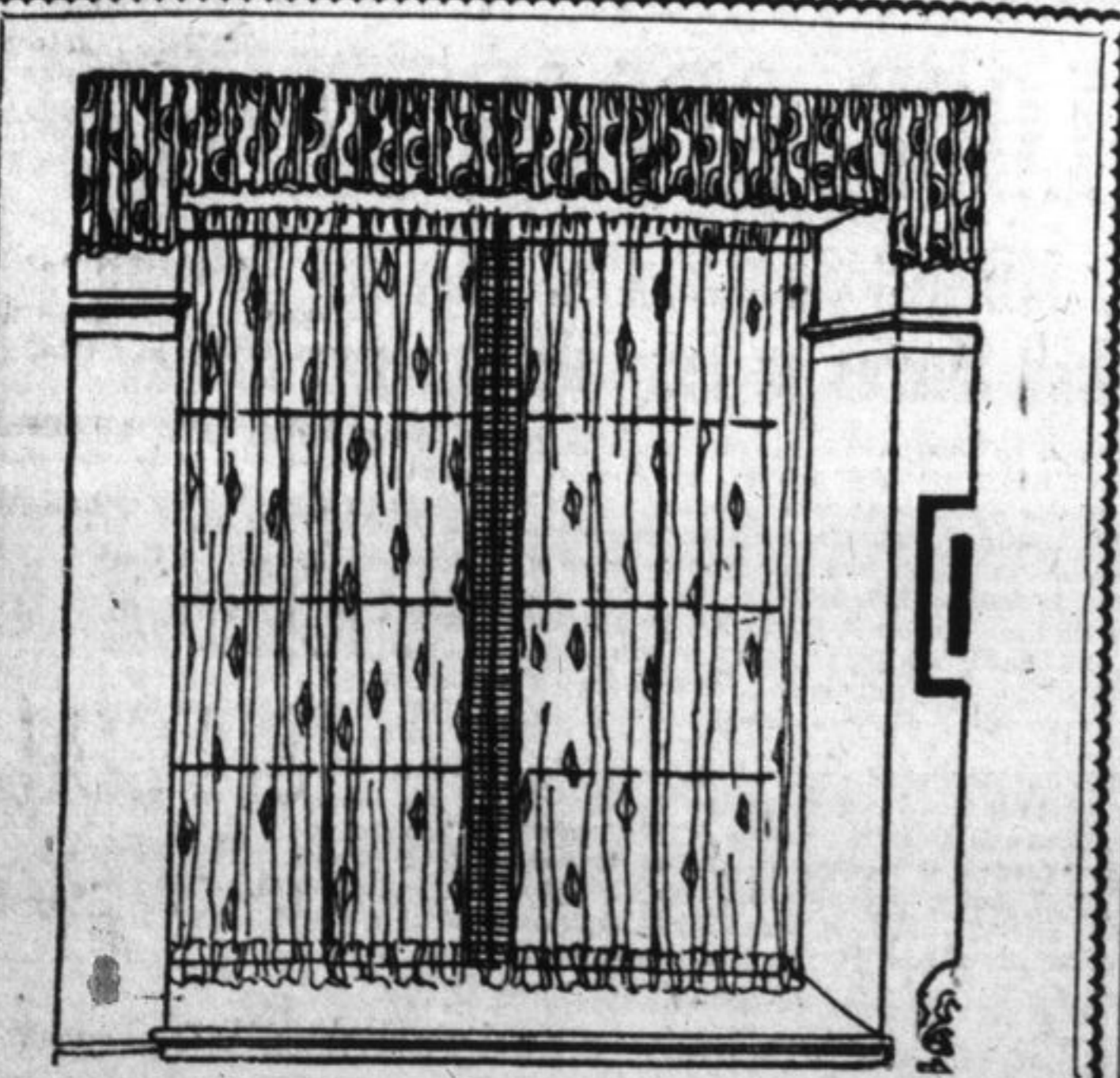
