HEARING POSTPONED. Protest Regarding Municipal Tax To Be Heard on Thursday.

Bill No. 80, which has to do with assessments for municipal income tax, was to have come up on Wednesday morning, in the private bills committee of the legislature, but it was learned that the hearing of the case had been postponed for a day.

At the present time citizens are exempt from municipal tax up to \$2,000 and the new bill proposes to exempt up to \$2,500. Kingston and many other cities of a similar size are protesting, in that if the new bill is carried the cities will suffer a serious loss in assessment. For instance in Kingston it is pointed out that there would be a loss of \$400,000 in assessment. The city council instructed Mayor Angrove to join the deputation and enter a protest against the proposed new bill. Assessment Commissioner Mc
