MISSIONARY GATHERING ST. ANDREW'S W.M.S.

Address in Sydenham Street Methodist Hall by Mrs. W. H. Henderson, Ottawa.

The members of the Woman's Missionary Society of Sydenham street Methodist church, had the pleasure of a visit on Wednesday from Mrs. W. H. Henderson, Ottawa, president of the Montreal Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society.

Mrs. R. O. Jolliffe, president of the Auxiliary, presided, and short addresses were given by Mrs. H. A. Lavell, dominion president, Mrs. W. M. Campbell, Mrs. A. E. Knapp, Prof. R. O. Jolliffe, and Dr. R. H. Bell.

Mrs. Henderson in a very clear and convincing manner told something of the work which is being carried by the W.M.S., and of the urgent need for more workers. The work was started forty-two years ago and has gradually expanded until at the present time a great amount of money is required to carry it to a successful termination.

The call of Canada is also great, Mrs. Henderson stated, and the foreigners who are rapidly coming into our country, need the attention of the W.M.S. She reminded her hearers that what they need most is to strengthen the home base by increasing the membership.

In closing, Mrs. Henderson complimented the board of the Woman's Missionary Society upon the excellent women who compose that body; women who could shine in any society, but who prefer to consecrate themselves to that work.

At the close of Mrs. Henderson's address, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to this most interesting speaker, on a motion of Mrs. W. S. Gordon, district organizer, and Miss Phyllis Coates, Circle president.

Mrs. W. M. Campbell, treasurer, announced that the Sydenham street society had already one hundred dollars for the Margaret Craig memorial which is to be in the form of an assembly hall in the school where this devoted missionary spent a great portion of her life.

Professor R. O. Jolliffe took occasion to congratulate the ladies on the excellent meeting, and his only regret was that there were not more men of the congregation present, although an open invitation had been given from the pulpit on Sunday.

Hears Address by Mrs. H. A. Lavell on Two Great Mission Conferences.

The members of St. Andrew's Auxiliary of the Women's Missionary Society had a great treat at their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, when Mrs. H. A. Lavell, president of the Dominion Council of the Methodist W.M.S., gave an account of the two great missionary conferences that she attended as the representative of her board in New York and Atlantic City.

One of the problems mentioned was the difficulty foreign students have in seeing so-called Christians by no means living up to their faith, to decide which way is the right way for them. There are 10,000 foreign students in the United States and of these nearly 50 per cent. lose their faith in Christianity and return to their own countries, either uncertain or out and out opposed.

The second conference was Foreign Missions, and the members were both men and women. There were wonderful inspirational addresses from Mr. Chamberlain, Mr. Robert Speer and others. A characteristic story was that of Mary Slessor. She had wonderful influence with the native chiefs, but on one occasion, two chiefs had such a serious quarrel that nothing she could say would induce them to forget a battle, so very early next morning she took a chair and her knitting and went off through the forest to where two trails met and there planted her chair and sat down with her knitting.

There were three outstanding addresses from Orientals on the Oriental view of Jesus Christ, from India, China and Japan. Johan Masih who was heard here this winter, spoke for India.
