THE GOLDEN JUBILEE

Of Three Sisters of the House of Providence on Wednesday.

Wednesday the 19th inst. was a gala day at the House of Providence, it being the "golden jubilee" of three of its members. On this day, fifty years ago, having completed the usual term of probation, Sister M. Berchmans (Ellen Candon), Sister M. Francis (Annie Candon) and Sister M. Ignatius (Elizabeth McMahon) consecrated themselves forever to the service of God by pronouncing the religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, in the Institute of the Sisters of Charity, Kingston.

March 19th being the Feast of St. Joseph, patron of the universal church, the community mass at 6.30 a.m. was celebrated with becoming joy and splendor. At eight o'clock His Grace Most Rev. M. J. Spratt, D.D., assisted by Rev. R. J. Coyle, offered the holy sacrifice, during which the jubilarians publicly renewed the solemn promises they made so long ago. Special hymns and music appropriate to the occasion were feelingly rendered by the choir.

The festivities during the day were strictly private, no invitations having been extended.

At 5 p.m. benediction of the most holy sacrament was given by Rev. R. J. Coyle, chaplain of the institute, after which, on behalf of the jubilarians, for all the blessings of which they have been the recipients for the long lapse of years, a solemn hymn of thanksgiving to God was sung.

In connection, there was also celebrated the "silver jubilee" of Sister M. Precious Blood (Lillian Gauthier), and Sister M. of Calvary (Mary Hayes).
