

H. C. Nickle's report was held until the last of the meeting to give an opportunity for discussion.

Two special reports were given by John D. Boyd, One of them was on gill net fishing in the St. Lawrence and the other on the preservation of Cedar Island. They were both good ones and were referred to the incoming council. 


