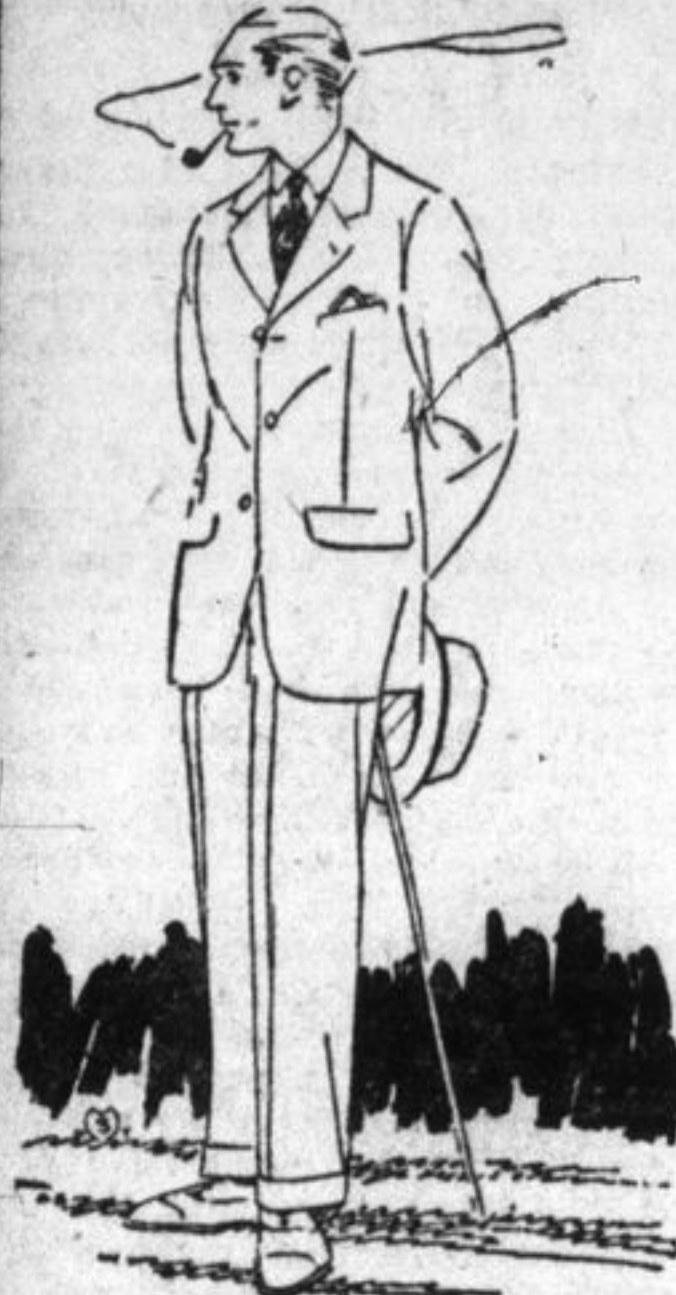

THE ANNUAL MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE

Interesting Reports on Power, Transportation and the Hotel Project.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trade was held Thursday night in the rooms in the Bank of Commerce Building with President Elmer Davis in the chair. The secretary, W. K. Macnee, presented his report for two years, there having been no annual meeting last year. R. E. Burns, auditor, also presented a report for two years, showing the condition of the board finances to be good and a bona fide membership of 147 at the present time.

The elections for the council were announced and the complete executive now stands: Honorary presidents, W. F. Nickle, A. E. Ross, A. M. Rankin; president, B. N. Steacy; first vice, W. H. Craig; second vice, T. G. Bishop; treasurer, J. F. Rowland; council, C. S. Anglin, R. E. Burns, J. M. Campbell, P. B. Chown; John Donnelly, J. G. Elliott, Elmer Davis, C. C. Folger, W. R. Givens, A. C. Hanley, T. A. Kidd, D. G. Laidlaw, C. A. MacPherson, Prof. A. C. Neish.

Reports of committees were presented as follows: Agricultural and markets, by J. W. Bell; banking, H. A. Tofield; education, John D. Boyd; harbor and marine, John Donnelly; house committee, the secretary in the absence of C. A. MacPherson; power, C. C. Folger; railways, by M. C. Dunn in the absence of J. M. Campbell; retail, W. Y. Mills; industries and hotels, H. C. Nickle; membership (convenor absent); entertainment, (convenor absent).

The reports of John Boyd, John Donnelly, Collamer Folger and H. C. Nickle were of especial interest and those of Messrs. Folger and Donnelly were greeted with great applause.

It was moved by J. G. Elliott, and heartily endorsed, that the board express its regret at the transfer of H. A. Tofield to Belleville and express the thanks of the members to him for his fine work in advancement of the aims of the Board of Trade.

Report on Power.

C. C. Folger, in his report on power, told the members of the board that the situation is indeed serious and that there does not seem to be any immediate relief in sight. He told of the efforts made to get an additional block of power and how, after it had been promised to delegations from Kingston, it had been cancelled after the delegations had left Toronto. Conservation of the present supply had made it possible to keep up with the present demand but left no room for expansion. The committee advocated a development of the St. Lawrence at Morrisburg, and that operations be started at once.

The reports of John Donnelly and H. C. Nickle gave in more complete detail the work done in connection with the exploitation of Kingston as the logical end of deep water and the situation in regard to industries and a hotel here at the present time. H. C. Nickle's report was held until the last of the meeting to give an opportunity for discussion.

Two special reports were given by John D. Boyd. One of them was on gill net fishing in the St. Lawrence and the other on the preservation of Cedar Island. They were both good ones and were referred to the incoming council. The matter of gill net fishing had been taken up by other municipalities along the St. Lawrence, following the lead of Kingston and would likely produce results.

The main portion of the evening's programme was a fine address by S. R. Parsons, Toronto, on Canada—National, Industrial and Commercial." It is given fully on page eleven.

Hotel Report.

When, at the close of the meeting, the hotel report of H. C. Nickle was thrown open for discussion, a lively time ensued. B. N. Steacy started the ball rolling with a few questions and then Dr. C. C. Nash, speaking on the proposition favored by the hotel committee, that of the Stevens Construction Company and the United Hotels Company, strongly condemned it and proceeded to tear it to pieces. H. C. Nickle was as quick to uphold it and a lively time ensued, during which the members had every opportunity to learn all about that topic of current interest. Mr. Nickle's reports were accepted but no resolutions were passed and no action taken on the matter.

Frontenac Home and School Club.

The regular meeting of the Frontenac Home and School Club was held on Thursday night in the school. The president, Mrs. S. Salisbury, was in the chair. The regular business was first discussed, after which George Pollitt gave a report from the Central council regarding playgrounds and this report was discussed. It was decided that the April meeting should take the form of a moving picture show and sale of homemade cooking. After the business, Major Harris showed some very fine pictures taken in France, Switzerland and other countries he had visited while overseas and they were much enjoyed by the audience. The school committee, under Mrs. Walker, served refreshments.
