After their sensational triumph over Hamilton Tigers, the Greyhounds are being much talked about these days.

Coach George McNamara, of the Greyhounds, will start the same team against the Sons of Ireland as swept the Tigers off their feet. OLYMPIC STADIUM TO TAKE CARE OF 60,900

Great Structure at Colombes Is Almost Ready for Coming Games.

Paris, March 2.—The Olympic athletic stadium at Colombes is virtually completed and soon will be turned over to the French Olympic Committee by the contractors. The original plans called for a stadium to accommodate 100,000 spectators, but the economic retrenchment of the city of Paris made this impossible.

The Colombes stadium will provide accommodation for 60,000 spectators distributed as follows: Ten thousand seats in the covered stand to be known as the "Tribune of Honor"; 10,000 seats in a covered stand on the back stretch of the track, which will be called the "Marathon Stand"; 15,000 places for standees in stands at the entrance of each of the four turns of the track; 25,000 places for standees in two stands at either end of the track.

There are 34 exits, each 20 feet wide, and the architect, M. Faure-Dujarrig, estimates that a capacity crowd could evacuate the stands in two minutes.

The stand set aside for the athletes will accommodate 1,500 and is located at the extreme right end of the Tribune of Honor. Immediately under the Honor Stand are the athletes' dressing rooms, 38 in number, and with accommodation for 1,200 athletes at one time.

Eighty shower baths, four massage rooms and an emergency hospital where the French Red Cross will work complete the arrangements for the welfare of the athletes.

Encircling the field itself is the track of 500 metres in length and 8.50 metres wide. It is built of fine red cinders, providing a happy color contrast with the green of the association and rugby football fields inside it and the spotless white of the stands to the outside.

Distributed just outside of the regulation football fields are the pits for the jumps, four each for the broad, high and vault. The javelin, discus, weight events will also be competed within the enclosure. The swimming pool is situated a few feet to the left of the honor
