"The Sickness That Destroyeth." Not long ago a newspaper woman, in speaking of her day's work to some friends, remarked that she had been at an isolation hospital, getting what is called in journalistic parlance, " a story." There were exclamations of horror from some of the listeners, and a distinct drawing away from her on the part of others. But the newspaper woman laughed. A few days later one of her audience was in a large butcher shop, where all sorts of meats are displayed, when a girl, very evidently far gone in tuberculosis, came in, and going up to the counter, asked in a husky voice for a piece of meat. As she did so she coughed unrestrainedly over the rest of the exposed meat, without taking the precaution of putting either hand or handkerchief to her mouth.

This sort of thing is being duplicated all over the country. Much has been done in the way of teaching people to take precautionary measures, but a very great deal remains to be done. Unfortunately, carelessness is to be found more often in the rural sections than in the cities and this fact accounts, in large measure, for the returns showing that the death rate from tuberculosis is higher (in proportion to population) in the country than in the cities. If children were taught when very small never to cough without putting the hand or the handkerchief before the mouth, one means of germ-distribution would be out off .- The Canadian Farmer.
