O.B.A.A. Annual. The annual meeting of the Ontario Baseball Amateur Association is to be held in the Carle-Rite hotel, Toronto, on Saturday next. 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FOUND NOT MARRIED TO LATE J. N. KNOWLTON

Justice Orde Decides Against Woman Who Lived With Him Forty Years. Toronto, April 1.—That Rosy Knowlton was never married to John Nelson Knowlton with whom she lived in domestic felicity for forty years, and that her four children are not the lawful children of Knowlton is the decision of Justice Orde on the trial of an issue to determine the question.

Knowlton was a farmer of the township of South Crosby, near Kingston. In 1883 a man named Lapointe was working for him, and knowing that Knowlton wanted a housekeeper brought his sister, Rosey, to the place. Rosey stated that while she was in hospital at Kingston awaiting arrival of her first born, Knowlton came to see her with an old Baptist minister, and they were married in hospital.

No corroboration of her story was forthcoming from the records. His lordship states that his sympathy is for the reputed wife. As he regards her story as a fabrication, he gives the costs against her. By Knowlton's will, made two days before his death, he left his estate, which includes a 75-acre farm, to his lawful heirs. These, according to the result of the judgment, are two brothers and two sisters. The case was originally held in Kingston over a year ago.

F.W.O.R. OFFICERS ANNUAL First Battalion Parade of Season Next Monday. At the annual meeting of the F.W.O.R. officers held Monday evening, Lieut.-Col. F. E. Sparks was presented with the officers' long service medal. Lieut.-Col. J. S. Skinner, a former commanding officer of the regiment, made the presentation.

It was decided that the first battalion parade of the season would take place on Monday evening next, and parades would be held on every Monday and Friday evenings in future, with shooting on Tuesday evenings. The reports of the different committees showed that the battalion was in a very healthy condition. The financial standing was considered to be very good.

Among the former commanding officers who were present were Col. H. J. Dawson, Lieut.-Col. J. S. Skinner, Lieut.-Col. W. Y. Mills and Lieut.-Col. H. E. Pease, and they all complimented the present officers on the excellent standing of the regiment.

Brig-Gen. W. S. Hughes, Ottawa, sent a letter of regret that he was unable to be present on account of official duties. A deputation has arrived in Ottawa, representing the Canadian Council of Agriculture. It will ask for reductions in the tariff, for the completing of the Hudson Bay Railway, and a division of the profits from the old wheat board.

Efforts to raise the Canadian Record, which is lying in 300 feet of water in front of Montserrat, having failed instructions have been issued by Ottawa to destroy the wreck which has become a danger to navigation at low tide.

Hon. W. F. Nickle, attorney-general, introduced a bill in the legislature to uphold by legislation the action of the Department of Mines in cancelling mining permits on properties on which the taxes were not paid.

The customs import returns for the month of March, 1924, as reported Tuesday, are \$25,554.49.

DESTROY PRINCIPLE OF CHURCH UNION BILL

By Ordering Amendment Allowing Congregations to Decide the Issue. Toronto, April 1.—The private bills committee of the Ontario legislature early this afternoon passed, by a vote of 36 to 26, an amendment to the church union bill whereby law clerks of the Crown are instructed to draw up clauses to add to the bill providing that Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian congregations may, by vote in their mother churches and retain their congregational property.

The vote on the amendment was not a party vote and the members in some instances voted against others of their own religious denominations. During the discussion on the amendment, Charles McKeown and W. E. Raney, who were in favor of the bill without amendment, said that the effect of the amendment would be to destroy the principle of the bill.

WOMAN IS RELEASED FROM PENITENTIARY In View of Her Condition—Serving Two Years for Petty Larceny. A Toronto woman who was serving a two year sentence in the Portsmouth penitentiary, and who is shortly to become a mother, was released from the prison on Tuesday and left for her home. The woman, who is twenty-one years of age, was sentenced for petty larceny. At the time she was sent to the Portsmouth institution, there was a great deal of objection taken in view of the fact that the woman was in a delicate condition, and the sentence was considered altogether too severe for the offense which she had committed. The matter was taken up with the department of justice at Ottawa with the result that orders were issued for the release of the woman on parole.
