

The man with the HOE says—

A good garden should be covered once a year with manure if it can be procured.

Every garden book and catalogue contains lists of fertilizers and how to use them. Follow them carefully and you can't go wrong. They have been worked out by experts, usually at government or state experiment stations.

Sprinkle wood ashes over the garden just before a rain. This is a great potash fertilizer and potash does not leach out of the soil. Potash is a necessary fertilizer for fruits and flowers.

Do not spade in sawdust or shavings. They form breeding nests for insects and fungus pests and are of little fertilizing value.

Sheep manure and cow manure in commercial form are fine fertilizers if no stable manure is procurable. They are very valuable to mix with the compost heap before it is spaded into the soil.

Dried blood is a good nitrogen supply and works more slowly than nitrate of soda. It may be dug in when seed is planted to good advantage.

Lime is good for sandy soil. It helps hold it together.

Try some new vegetable this year. You can't improve either yourself as a gardener or your garden without a certain amount of experimenting.

If you are looking for reliable head lettuce, tried by many gardeners, order Iceberg and Mignonette. The latter is a favorite summer variety with Western gardeners.

If you never grew any of the big winter radishes, try a packet of seed this year. Plant it in June.

Order plenty of seed, get lettuce and radishes by the ounce.
