HISTORICAL

To Be Put on at Kingston Exhibition-Committee Making Arrangements.

A meeting of the committee that will assist in arranging for the historical pageant to be put on during the week of the Kingston Industrial Exhibition in September, was held in the office of the department agriculture on Thursday afternoon. In the absence of Col. J. N. S. Leslie, who was elected chairman at last meeting, Prof. W. P. R. Bridger was asked to preside. J. W. Belshaw, representing the John Rogers Productions, Festoria, O., set before the committee an attractive plan for a Canadian pageant, which will include in Kingston, the local history, beginning with the landing of Count Frontenac, who will come up the St. Lawrence in war canoes (lent by the Royal Military College). The capitulation of Fort Frontenac to Bradstreet in 1758; the coming of the United Empire Loyalists, Lord Simcoe's installation as first gover nor of Upper Canada and other historical incidents, ending with a scene showing Kingston men going to and returning from the great war. 
