Strathonas at Fort Osborne Barracks, Winnipeg, Remember Their Honorary Colonel.

Major-General, Sir Archibald Macdonell, K.C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., Commandant of R.M.C., received the following telegram on Friday: "Three hundred past and present Strathonas, assembled at Fort Osborne barracks, Winnipeg, send loyal and affectionate greetings to the honorary colonel of the regiment with which we are all so proud to be connected. (sgd.) Capt. Powell."

Sir Archibald was formerly commanding officer of the Strathona Horse, one of the most famous cavalry regiments on the western front during the Great War. The telegram pleased him immensely.

LATE GEORGE A. TURKINGTON.

Passed Away at Yonge Mills After a Short Illness. Yonge Mills lost an estimable resident in the death of G. A. Turkington, who passed peacefully away at his home on March 26th. He had been ailing for sometime but had only been confined to his bed for two weeks.

The late Mr. Turkington was born at Yonge Mills on April 19th, 1852, and was the son of S. J. and Nancy Turkington. He had spent all his days in this vicinity and in his early manhood he followed farming till thirteen years ago when he took up county work and later was promoted to a highway contractor. He followed this work till failing health appeared.

Deceased was twice married, his first wife was Estella Deury, Rossie, N.Y., who predeceased him thirty-two years ago. By this union they had one daughter, Mrs. Theodore Fiato, Portmouth, Ont. In 1898 he married Miss Mercy Gillman, Lyndhurst, Ont., who survives to mourn the loss of a friend and loving husband and father.

The funeral was held from his late residence to Yonge Mills cemetery on Friday, where a very impressive sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Gardiner. The pallbearers were four cousins of the deceased.
