

Use of Military Clothing. Notice has been given by G. J. Desbarats, deputy minister, department of national defence, that the wearing of any military uniform or article of military clothing is now deemed to be unauthorized except on a definite military duty or parade, for memorial services, celebrations and official functions in connection with the late war provided permission has been given by the district officer commanding; for military funerals where similar permission has been given, or for other occasions where special authority is issued by the officers commanding a military dis-

Announcement is made that, pursuant to the order-in-council which went into effect on March 31st, persons who wear military uniforms or military clothing on occasions and under circumstances other than those authorized, render themselves liable to prosecution under the Criminal Code of Canada and are thereby liable to a fine not exceeding \$300 or to imprisonment for any term up to 12 months, or both fine and imprisonment.

BUILDING A LONG YACHT.

James Parker, Oswego, N.Y., Hopes. To Sail Her on July 4th.

Oswego, N. Y., Times. Ald. James Parker, former commodore of the Oswego, N.Y., Yacht Club, is building a new boat-a combination sailing and power yachtwhich will be one of the largest of its type to be found on the southern

shore of Lake Ontario. Work is progressing rapidly on the boat and a wager is being held that it will be in sailing condition by July 4th. It will be 43 feet over all, 11 feet and 10 inches beam with a water line of 26 feet and will have a combination center board and keel. There will be no cabin above the deck, which will extend back to the cockpit. The keel was hewn from

The yacht will be yawl-rigged and the two masts will be about fifty feet high. A thirty horse power gasoline engine will be installed. The boat is being built for salt as well as fresh water, all of the bolts galvanized fron.

The designer of the craft is Michfastest boats in his locality. The builder is James R. Botting, who is an expert in that work. It will be Alderman Parker's third boat and those who are familiar with it de-

The new yacht will be in shape of the Lake Yacht Racing Association, which will be held in Big Sodus bay the coming summer.
