SIMPSON AND BRYANS AROUND OGDENSBURG?
 A Prescott Despatch Says Escaped Convicts Crossed River Three Times There.
 Are Gordon Simpson and Thomas Bryans two members of the gang who made a sensational getaway from the Portsmouth penitentiary on September 10th, 1923, in this district? Word has been received here to the effect that the men were at Ogdensburg, N.Y., recently and the police and the immigration authorities at Kingston have been advised to keep a sharp lookout for the men. A despatch from Prescott has the following:
 "Gordon Simpson, alleged murderer and member of the gang of desperadoes who entered a bank at Toronto and stole \$35,000 last fall has been traced to Ogdensburg, N.Y. Thomas Bryans, a member of the group, is said to have passed through that city three times in the last two weeks. Immigration officers on both sides of the line have been unsuccessful in securing information regarding the wanted men, despite the fact that they are reported to have crossed to Prescott a number of times."
 Bryans and Simpson made their escape from the Portsmouth penitentiary along with "Red" Ryan and Edward McMullen.
 The records show that Bryans was sentenced in April, 1920, by Justice Middleton, for manslaughter, and given fifteen years. He is about 22 years of age.
 Gordon Simpson was sentenced by Judge Coatsworth and Magistrate Denison, in Toronto, to ten years, on May 14th, 1921, on numerous charges of shopbreaking and theft. He is 24 years old. McMullen was captured a few hours after the gang made their sensational getaway from the "pen" and "Red" Ryan some months later.
 Arthur Brown, the fifth member of the gang, was shot dead by a detective at Minneapolis.

 Late Mrs. Janet McMaster. A venerable resident of Kingston passed away on Monday in the person of Mrs. Janet McMaster, who died in the Kingston General hospital at the age of 102 years. The funeral will be of a private nature from the residence of her son, James McMaster, 23 Russell street, on Wednesday afternoon to Cataract cemetery.
F. J. WILSON LEAVING WORK AT Y.M.C.A.
 General Secretary Will Go Into the Insurance Business
 F. J. Wilson, general secretary of the Y.M.C.A., has tendered his resignation and will go into the insurance business in the city with J. B. Cooke, who has the local agency of the Imperial Life Insurance Company.
 The resignation of Mr. Wilson was accepted at a meeting of the board of directors of the Y.M.C.A. held on Monday night but he will "carry on" until a new man has been selected for this position.
 Mr. Wilson entered Y.M.C.A. work here in September, 1911. For three years served as boys' work secretary and was promoted to the position of general secretary nine years ago. He has been very prominent in boys' work and has accomplished much for the good of the association and in his leaving the local "Y" loses a valuable man. The best wishes of a very large circle of friends will go with him in his new sphere of work.

COACH HUGHES WILL RETURN TO QUEEN'S AGAIN IN FALL
 Although official confirmation has not yet been obtained as yet, it is learned on good authority that Coach W. P. Hughes, who handled the Queen's dominion championship football team in both their final campaigns for those honors and was last year appointed regular coach, will return. Many rumors have been floating around as to where he would be found for the 1924 season, but few thought that he would leave Queen's. Ottawa claimed that he was killed to arrive there, but the authority on which we publish the news of his return to Kingston is a reliable one. Players and fans will be glad to hear of his return.
 Russell T. Scott, whose sensational descent from broker to bandit has come to light with his arrest in Chicago, is a native of Madoc. He is little more than thirty years of age. Jean Crawford Kerr, wife of Harry Green, Belleville, died on Sunday very suddenly at the Belleville General Hospital, aged twenty-three years.

QUEEN'S THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE CONVOCATION
 Held on Monday Evening—Five Young Men Graduate as Ministers.
 Two young men were ordained and three licensed to preach at the convocation and closing exercises of Queen's Theological College held in Convocation hall on Monday evening. Dr. R. Bruce Taylor, D.D., principal of the university, presided, and a very large crowd attended. Rev. I. N. Beckstead, moderator of Kingston Presbytery, conducted the ceremony of licensing to preach and ordination. The prizes and scholarships won by students of the faculty on the year's work were presented by Prof. William Morgan. Messrs. D. K. Faris, B.A., Aurora, and H. D. Ashford, B.A., Newcastle, Ont., were the two young men ordained. Mr. Faris is an arts graduate of Queen's, belonging to the year '21. Mr. Ashford came to Queen's this year from Halifax to complete his theological course. Those licensed to preach were Messrs. A. N. Reid, B.A., Bristol; A. G. MacMillan, Maxville, Ont.; and C. C. Gilbert, Kingston.
 At the close of the impressive service the gathering was addressed by Rev. Dr. J. R. P. Sclater, of Parkdale Presbyterian church, Toronto. He opened his remarks with praise for this Canada, to which he had come from the old country, although admitting that he sometimes "missed the hills." He referred to the road building of the Canadians, done in straight lines in spite of obstacles, as a sign of virility and determination which might be compared to the methods of the ancient Romans when in their prime of strength and glory. Public buildings should be beautifully constructed in his opinion, in the work of developing a sense of beauty, which must have a great effect on the life of any community. He told the successful students that it was a great privilege to be a leader of thought in these times and congratulated them heartily on their attainments.
 C. C. Gilbert, on behalf of the graduating students, delivered an address of farewell, stating that very kind memories would be retained by them all of their studies at Queen's and of the kindness and helpfulness of the members of the theological faculty. Their courses at Queen's had made them more strong in their belief of powers unseen and they went forth strengthened and encouraged.
 The degree of bachelor of divinity was conferred upon Rev. Gladstone E. Wood, B.A., Carp, Ont.; Rev. John W. MacKinnon, B.A., Rev. C. S. Reddick, B.A., Janetville, Ont.
 The loss of the late G. M. Macdonell, K.C., was referred to by Dr. S. W. Dyde, principal of the theological college, in his remarks. The late well known citizen had been associated with the college for many years and had endeared himself with all those with whom he had come in contact.
 Dr. Dyde thanked Dr. Sclater for his address and added his congratulations to those already tendered to the successful students.
 The benediction at the close of the ceremonies was pronounced by the Rev. G. A. Brown, of Chalmers church.
