Savory Potatoes

(Tempting with broiled meats, fish or cold meats)

- 6 potatoes
- 2 onions
- 2 tablespoons Crisco
- 1/4 teaspoonful salt
- chopped parsley
- pepper
- 1/2 cupful water
- 1/2 cupful milk

Put Crisco in saucepan. Peel and slice thin the potatoes. Chop parsley and onions. Put in layer of potatoes, layer of onions and parsley, season. Repeat until all are used. Add water, cover, simmer 30 minutes. Add milk, simmer 15 minutes.

Nothing is of so much importance and of so much use to a young man entering life as to be well criticized by women.

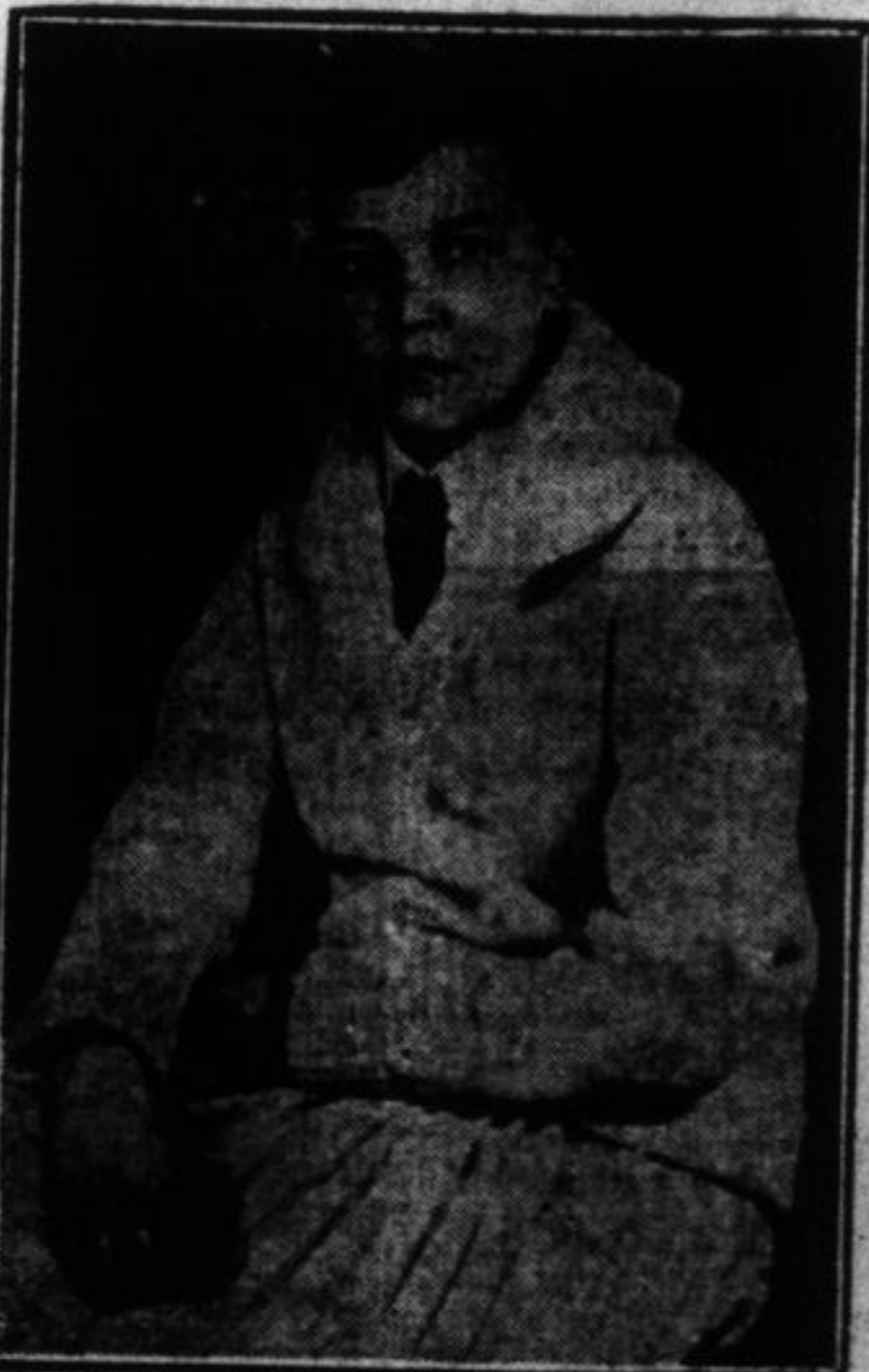
