O'Brien Sisters and Company Offer Excellent Vaudeville on Same Bill.

When it comes to a mixture of tragedy and drama, Barbara La Marr does not have to doff her expensive Paris hat to any person. In "Thy Name is Woman," now showing at the Capitol, she is putting over one of the finest pieces of acting seen on the stage or on the screen in a long time. The prime minister pointed out that the agreement had been entered into eleven years ago when the Conservative government was in power. "If such government found it impossible to undertake the work, the task of this government, with no representation from Toronto, is much more difficult," he declared. WIPED OUT BY FIRE.

The Old Townsite of Kapuskasing Is No More. Kapuskasing, April 11.—The remaining part of the old townsite of Kapuskasing, commonly called Stewartville was totally wiped out by fire early this morning. The total loss will be in excess of \$200,000 partly covered by insurance. The cause of the fire is suspected to have been of incendiary origin. STRAIGHT PARTY VOTE ON JUDICATURE ACT

Minister of Justice Decides That Ferguson Government Exceeds Its Powers.

Toronto, April 11.—On a straight party vote—Conservatives against Liberals and Progressives—second reading was given last night to the Government measure amending the Judicature Act, reconstituting the Court of Appeal in Ontario and claiming the right of the province to designate judges as heads of divisions of the court. The vote was 55 to 14. The vote was taken at 11 o'clock after a debate which continued from a little after 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Outstanding among the events of the discussion was the reading by Attorney-General Nickle of a letter from the Minister of Justice at Ottawa, declaring his intention of recommending that the act, if passed, be disallowed, and the reply of the attorney-general, also read to the House, in which the province stated its position to be that the final determination and decision as to the rights in question between the two parties would be fought in the courts. Both the attorney-general and the premier declared that the case would be carried to the privy council. Although every member of the legislature was in favor of Hon. J. R. Cooke's bill to bonus secondary Hydro transmission lines, as well as primary lines, to the extent of 50 per cent of installation costs, the legislature spent most of the after-

noon yesterday discussing the matter. The debate was primarily a dispute between the Conservatives and the Progressives as to which Government was entitled to the credit of introducing Hydro to rural Ontario on favorable terms.

PRINCE HENRY TO REPRESENT GREAT BRITAIN AT OLYMPIC

Prince Henry, third son of King George will do the honors for Great Britain at the opening of the Olympic games in the Colosseum Stadium, near Paris, on August 5th, leading the British athletes in the grand march past the reviewing stand. The British have high hopes of making a good showing in the Olympic finals, particularly since the wearers of the Union Jack took third place among the 17 countries competing in the winter sports at Chamonix. The British are spending \$30,000 to equip and maintain their Olympic teams, of which only \$2,600 remains to be raised.
