## LITTLE UNEMPLOYMENT

More Jobs Offered at Employment Bureau Than There Are Applicants.

The report of Allen Stroud, the local representative of the Ontario government labor employment bureau, which was issued Tuesday morning, shows that there is an improvement in the unemployment situation in Kingston. On Tuesday Mr. Stroud had more positions available than there were men on hand to fill them. The report is as follows:

"Unemployment to date would be very small if applicants seeking work were willing to accept the vacancies that are now listing daily. This is due to the large amount of building construction, both permanent and repair work, which apart from street-paving and road repair work, total approximately \$651,000. The estimated cost for street paving and street repair work will be around \$110,000. This work alone will entail the employment of nearly 150 men, together with the building trades means the employment of a large number of men.

"In the manufacturing industries, big improvement is shown in the Canadian Locomotive Works, who have to date 435 employees, including office staff. Other industries don't show much improvement, such as woollen and cotton mills—the former closed down temporarily and the latter on four days a week. The same might be said of the piano trade, although orders are coming in fairly well. This trade in parts are only working four days a week.

"There has been great activity in marine circles on the sixty odd vessels that wintered in Kingston harbor. When it is estimated that each boat takes on from ten to twenty hands, this certainly absorbs a large number of unemployed."

**AN INNOVATION ON THE CANADIAN NATIONAL**

**A Lunch Counter Service is Provided Between Toronto and Winnipeg.**

For the convenience of its patrons, the Canadian National Railways are now operating colonist cars equipped with lunch counters on "The National" between Toronto and Winnipeg, leaving Toronto 10.45 p.m. daily, arriving Winnipeg 4.10 p.m. the third day, and from Winnipeg to Toronto leaving Winnipeg 12.30 p.m. daily, arriving Toronto 7.20 a.m. the third day. Hot tea, coffee, and boiled sandwiches, pies, jam, milk, bread, butter, baked beans, etc., may be purchased at the lunch counter at any time during the day.

This service is, of course, in addition to the regular dining car service operated on the above-mentioned trains.
