AUCTION BRIDGE ANALYZED

IF YOUR PARTNER TRUMPS YOUR ACE, GRIN, ADVISES WYNNE FERGUSON—GOOD DISPOSITION, CARD PLAYER'S MOST VALUABLE QUALITY, HE ASSERTS.

What is the most valuable quality that a person can possess, to make him or her a successful auction player? No doubt you will all answer, "Card Sense," but the writer is of a contrary opinion. A good, squable disposition is worth more at the card table than any other quality.

The world loves a grin and has no use for the scowl. Apply this rule to the auction table and you will soon get the point. It's the player who can take his losses and bad speaks with a grin, who gets there. He isn't ruffled himself and what is even more to the point, he doesn't ruffle his partner.

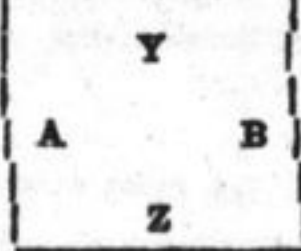
Think over in your own mind how many tricks you have lost, either by losing your temper or causing your partner to lose his. Loss of temper inevitably means loss of tricks. Every one cannot be an expert, but everyone can and should be an agreeable player.

Keep your temper and your grin and the tricks will take care of themselves. There's nothing like a good temper as a sound foundation for successful play. If you don't believe it, try it out, not for one night or one week, but for several months. If you haven't materially improved your play and your bank account by that time, then I will be very much surprised. Remember, the smile wins at the auction table as it does everywhere else.

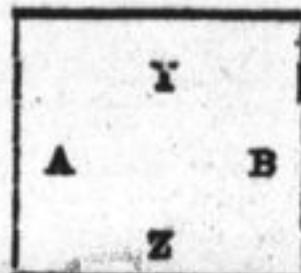
Hand No. 1



- h-S c-A Q J 7 4 d-7 6 5 2 s-K Q J

No score: Z dealt and bid one spade, which A doubled. Y passed, B bid two clubs, Z bid two diamonds. A bid three clubs, Y and B passed and Z bid three diamonds. A passed and Y bid three spades. What should B now do with the foregoing hand? B should bid four clubs. A's double of one spade and subsequent bid of three clubs should indicate more than a fair chance for game. B's hand is much above the average and worth a three club bid, irrespective of A's double and raise. As a matter of fact, A B could have made five clubs and game, but B doubled three spades and only defeated the contract by one trick. In the writer's opinion this double of three spades is unsound.

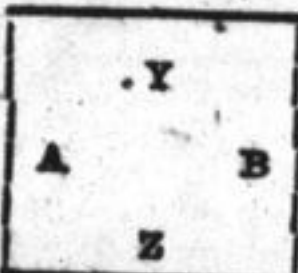
Hand No. 2



- h-none c-A J 10 7 5 d-K Q J 9 7 5 s-K 8

No score: Z dealt and bid one diamond, A bid one heart, Y one no-trump, and B two hearts. What should Z now do with the foregoing hand? Z should unquestionably bid three clubs and force his partner to choose between clubs and diamonds. If Y has anything that looks like a no-trump, Z should make game either in diamonds or clubs. In the actual play, Z bid two no-trump and Y Z failed to make game, while at diamonds they could have made five odd. With a two-suit hand of this type always bid both suits if you get the chance.

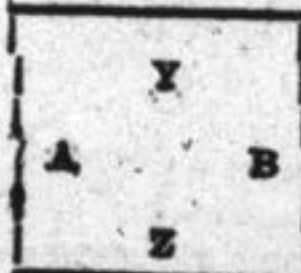
Hand No. 3



- h-S c-Q 10 9 8 d-A Q 10 4 s-K 8 7 5

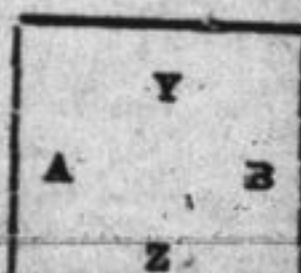
No score: What should Z, as dealer, bid with the foregoing hand? The dealer should bid one diamond. This is another hand of the type discussed a few weeks ago. The singleton heart is a danger spot so the diamond bid is better than one no-trump. If partner bids one heart, then the dealer should bid one no-trump.

- h-A 9 4 2 c-K 10 9 2 d-A Q 9 s-5 2



No score: Z dealt and bid one spade, which A doubled. Y passed, B bid two clubs, Z bid two diamonds. A bid three clubs, Y and B passed and Z bid three diamonds. A passed and Y bid three spades. B doubles three spades and all passed. What should A lead from the foregoing hand? A should open the five of spades. Z has bid two suits, spades and diamonds, and Y has showed preference for spades. That probably means that he is short of diamonds and if so it is very necessary to lead trumps and prevent Y from trumping A's good diamonds. As a matter of fact, the lead of the spade is the only one that will defeat the contract. If A opens the club, Y Z will just make their contract. Note that Hands Nos. 1 and 4 were held by A and B as partners.

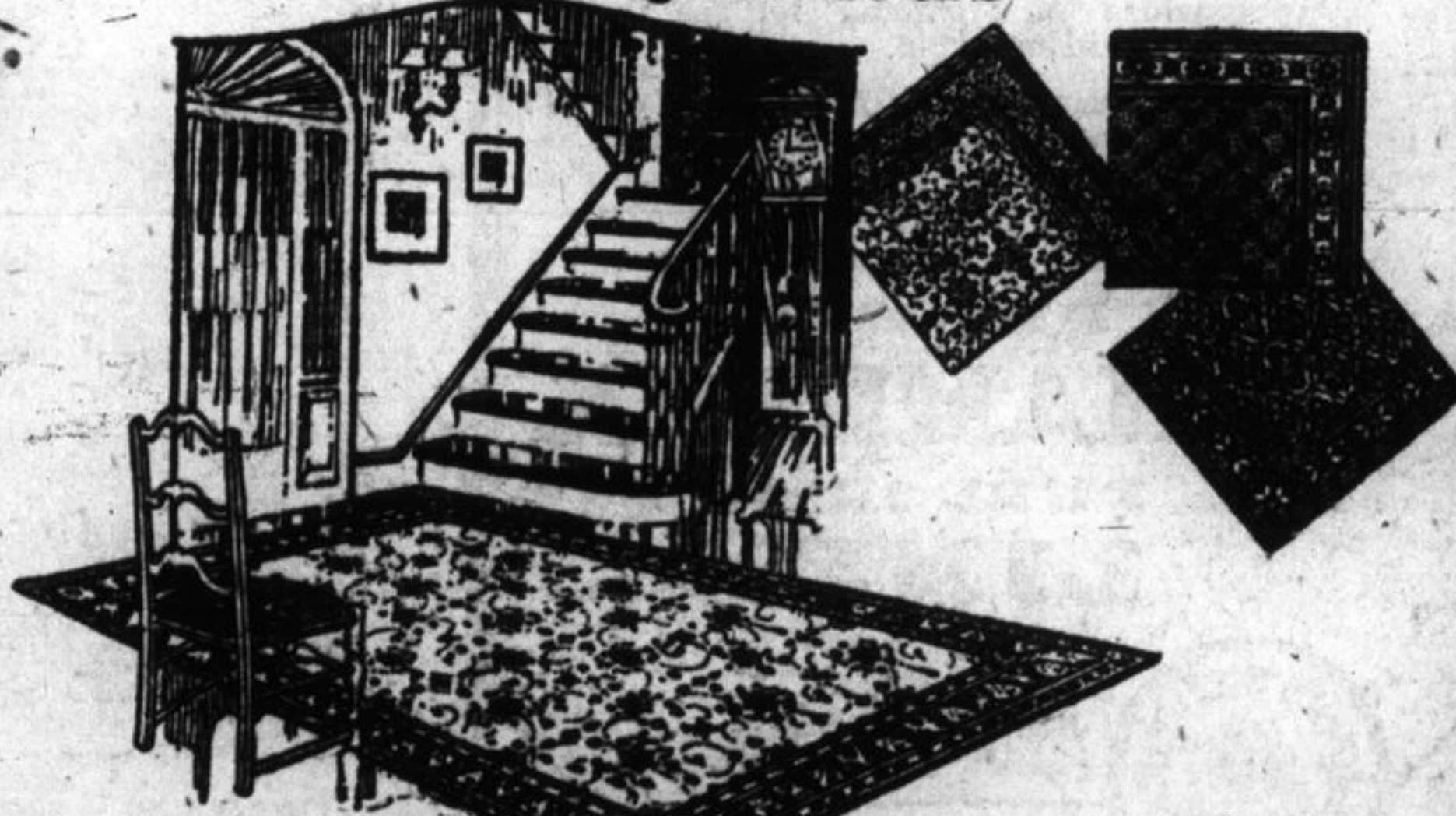
