What is this going to do for you? Well, the only thing that Nature has provided to purify your blood and to burn up the wastes in your body is the oxygen in the air.

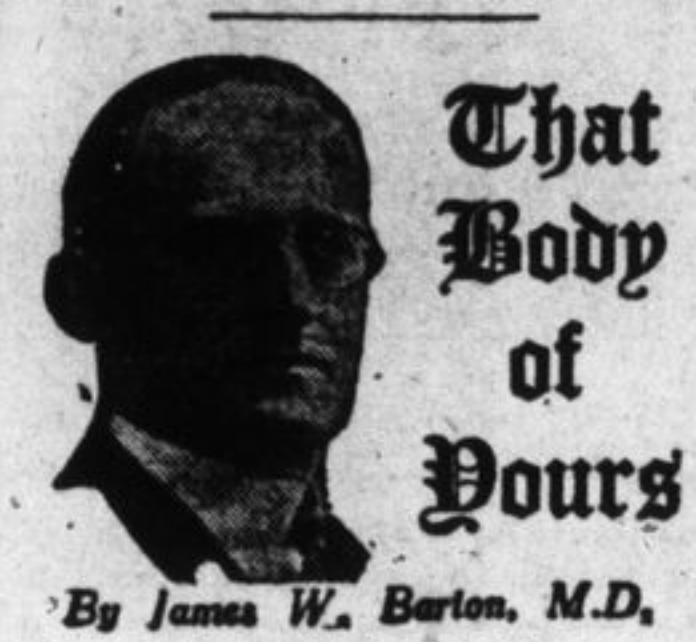
