





Could Not Take Oath; Left Out of

Toronto Globe.
Philip Dorland's troubles with the first Parliament of Upper Canada are further explained by a reader signing himself "Osgoode Hall." It will be recalled that Dorland was Quaker settler among the U. Loyalists at Adolphustown, on th Bay of Quinte, and he was unable to take his seat in parliament at Newark because of his inability take the required oath. "Osgoode

The Byztander at the Office Win dow in this morning's Globe, speaking of Philip Dorland (the Quaker who had been, in 1792, elected the first member for Prince Edward and Adolphustown), says: "Colonel Macdonell, the Speaker. . .. after consideration of a statement presented by Dorland, declared the seat va-

This is not quite accurate. The facts are that on Wednesday, Sept. 19th, 1792, "on motion made and seconded," the House of Assembly ordered that a statement signed by Dorland which had been laid before the House by the Secretary of the Province be read. It was read accordingly. From it, It appeared that in pursuance of a writ to send "one Knight girt with a sword, the most fit and discreet to represent the said county." Philip Dorland had been elected, but that, "being one of the persons commonly called Quakers," he could not conscientlously take the oath required by the Canada Act of 1791.

The House (not the Speaker) decided the incapacity of Dorland and ordered a new writ to issue.
